

Father Simon Our Assistant Area Dean writes:



The phrase "putting 'Christ' back in 'Christmas'" has been so overused over the years that, against the headwinds of our prevailing

culture, success might simply be seen as ensuring the family chocolate Advent calendar has a picture of the nativity behind the final door or window!

But for Christians, it should be a dominant thought as we enter this final month of the year. It means connecting how we celebrate with why we celebrate. This means finding ways to tell the Christmas story afresh for this time and for a new generation. And, with the COP29 climate-change conference still in our wing-mirrors, that should encompass an awareness of celebrating in a way that's in keeping (no Christmas pun intended!) with God's call for us to care for the planet and its peoples.

However, even those of us who are usually striving to live lives that are environmentally-friendly, generous, and ethical can find ourselves tempted to abandon these principles in the festive season, as we seek to make things special for ourselves and our loved ones. Lots of presents, food, drink, and glitzy decorations are all part of the traditional Christmas celebrations which, rather than for a few days towards the end of this month, have already started.

But, as Christians, does such indulgence really do justice to what we're celebrating: a saviour born to a poor family who would become refugees and a God who loved the world so much that he was born here to save it?

So, do we really need those additional new decorations? What about getting somebody one really

thoughtful gift, rather than giving them a shower of presents? And if you're struggling to find that perfect gift, what about giving a donation to a charity on that person's behalf? And then there's that Santa hat or elf costume for that party: do you really need it? Try to resist buying clothes you'll only wear once or twice because parts of the fashion industry are one of the biggest contributors to climate change and modern slavery. Meanwhile, recyclable wrapping paper without the sparkly bits is always better for the environment, as is, if at all possible, local and organic food, cooking only what you think you might actually eat, rather than over-catering and wasting food.

An eco-friendly, ethical Christmas doesn't have to be more expensive. And simple can still be very special. So, this year, let's try to be kinder to the planet, give to the poor, cherish our loved ones, spend time with the lonely, embrace those who are grieving, and pray for those we find it hard to get along with... because that's where you'll really find Christ in Christmas.



Little Hadham Gardening Club

We do not meet in December but the committee would like to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Plants to protect over winter:-

The damp and cold can take their toll on our gardens, so spare a thought for tender plants struggling to survive in sub-zero temperatures. Protecting tender plants takes little effort, and often all that is needed is a layer of horticultural fleece. This lets in light, air and water at the same time as providing vital insulation. Even plants that can withstand temperatures down to -5 degrees C will benefit from some protection.

- 1. Agapanthus some species are hardier than others so if planted in pots, wrap in fleece for the winter until sure on their hardiness. If planted in borders mulch over the top.
- 2. Banana in milder areas the hardier banana, Musa basjoo, can withstand winter, especially with a mulch spread over the roots and a thatch of straw to protect the crown. In colder regions, or for more tender species, lift and pot up the plants, then overwinter them under glass.
- 3. Canna Cannas overwinter underground as rhizomes. A 10cm duvet of mulch helps to insulate against frost. In colder areas, lift plants up in Autumn, pot up and keep frost free and barely watered until Spring. Harden off before planting out in late May.



- 4. Cordyline plain green leaves and those with cream variegations tend to be tougher than those with striped or red tinted leaves. Tie the leaves in an upright bunch and then protect with fleece or hessian.
- 5. Echium pirinana these exotic natives of Madeira and the Canary Islands must reach a good size to flower. Your best bet is to plant Echiums in a sheltered spot and wrap with a double layer of fleece for the winter, giving them a chance to bloom the following season.
- 6. Melianthus major the honey bush is mainly grown for its exotic blue green foliage. Wrap the foliage securely with fleece until there is no danger of frost.
- 7. Pineapple lily Eucomis produces a spike of flowers under a tuft of bracts in summer, then dies back. Move potted plants under glass for winter or wrap the pots in hessian and move to a sheltered spot. Mulch over the top of planted bulbs.
- 8. Tree fern large tree ferns should be wrapped up, covering the crown by bending old fronds over it, fill it with straw or put a cap of fleece over it, or wrap entire plant up in hessian.



My children love Christmas and they're already picking extra treats off the shelf when we go shopping, and telling me what presents they want. I really want to make it a special time for them, but times are tough and I can't help worrying about overspending and getting into debt. What can I do to manage my finances during the holiday season, and where can I turn if I find myself struggling?

The festive season can be a financially challenging time, and often borrowing money or using a credit card to fund Christmas can seem like your only option. But there are steps you can take to keep your spending under control and avoid falling into debt.

The first thing to do is make a budget and stick to it.

Consider who you're buying gifts for, what other seasonal expenses you have, and how much you can realistically afford to spend. Always keep receipts, or ask for gift receipts, in case you overspend and need to return something. And remember that household bills may be higher during this period due to colder weather and spending more time indoors.

If you've built up debt, please don't ignore bills or letters. Speak to the organisation you owe money to, as they may let you pay smaller amounts.

Pay 'priority debts' first, like rent, mortgage arrears, council tax, and energy bills. For other types of debt like credit cards or loans, gather all the information on what you owe, create a budget, and contact your creditors to set up an affordable repayment plan. This might seem scary, but it's an important first step.

If your budget just doesn't add up and you need help to afford essentials like bills and food, see what cost of living support is available on the Citizens Advice website.

It's especially important to check if you're eligible for the Winter Fuel Payment, which will now only be paid to those who receive Pension Credit or other means-tested benefits. If you make a claim for Pension Credit by 21 December, you might still receive the Winter Fuel Payment.

If you do find yourself struggling financially during or after the holidays, don't panic. Support is out there, and Citizens Advice East Herts can help you understand what's available. We're here to help you find a way forward.

If you don't have phone or email or need extra support, Citizens Advice Contact Centre in Manor House, Buntingford, is open every Monday from 11am to 1pm, where our friendly staff will listen to what's happening and help you work out what to do next.

Little Hadham Village Hall News

If you were using the village hall during November, you will know that the gas heating at the village hall was out of use due to leaks in the system. We had hoped that repairing the pipework would be a quick fix, but unfortunately it transpired that there were just too many leaks within the system to repair. With the gas heating out of use, we were fortunate to be able to borrow enough powerful electric heaters to heat the hall and remotely control using smart timers. Thank you to those who were able to lend the village hall their electric heaters and of course, to those who have coped with wearing an extra layer for warmth! Hopefully by the time you read this, an upgrade to radiators and pipework throughout the hall is well underway, if not complete.

Last month we reported an expensive repair to a section of the flat roof, costing over £8k. This month upgrading the heating system will be around £12k, a big dent in our resources. Replacing radiators in the main hall will lead to pipes being chased into our already rather tired looking and worn-out hall floor. Refurbishing the floor will be a further expense of up to £5k.

Securing new funding for capital projects is often very difficult with grantors preferring to support operational costs for community projects only. If you would like to help support the village hall,



Millennium Wood

Jono Forgham

Following my surgery this summer, I am now no longer able to wield heavy tools such as chainsaws and strimmers. Consequently, I have decided to pass on the running of Millennium Wood to others and am very happy to say that Rachel Seifert and Jonathon Kemmish have both expressed an interest in organising work parties, carrying out woodland management and maybe planning some community events.

I have passed on all my management plans, the tools bought from woodland funds, bank account details along with a selection of books about managing woodland to Jonathon.

I am confident that the wood will continue to flourish and remain an important part of the community. Over the last 14 years or so I have endeavoured to establish the wood, keep is accessible and to enhance the habitat for all forms of wildlife. I have a long list of creatures recorded within the wood and, as the wood matures, it is likely that more wildlife will take up residence. I am, for instance, still recording new moth species here, showing that certain plants and trees are now offering insect larvae the opportunity to feed upon them and for the adults to nectar upon them as well as feeding on the pollen. I include a few autumnal moth species taken recently in the wood.

My swansong will be Sunday 1st
December when there will be a work
party 10 – 1pm to complete all the jobs
I intended to by the end of the year.
All are welcome. Please come along

help establish the butterfly glade I
have been working on for a while.

St Cecilia's Church Bells

Quasi

We are very lucky in England as we have so many churches throughout the country where bell ringing takes place, and where the bells have been used and maintained by generations of bellringers for hundreds of years.

The sound of our bells is very different to the chiming / tolling of church bells in some European countries, or the call to prayer loudly broadcast over loudspeakers in Muslim countries.

Of course, it is not just the church bells that are needed, but the bellringers and those that care and maintain the bells. Bellringers are adept at controlling their bell, and perfecting the timing of the changes in co-ordination with the others in the band, to produce the sounds we hear on a Sunday morning, at Weddings and other significant occasions. The skills of the bell ringers are often taken for granted and not fully appreciated. The care and maintenance of the bells is a skill that is also passed down, usually though bellringers.

We often watch events on the TV in Cathedrals where the commentators give great praise to the musicians playing their musical instruments, or the vocalists singing. However, rarely does the sound of the bells at the beginning or end of the service get a mention. Bellringers are quite happy to shun the limelight as often the bellringing chamber is tucked away at the back of the church, sometimes there is sometimes even



a small door with a staircase leading up to the bell chamber so the ringers are 'invisible' to the congregation.

Ringers usually arrive early before a service to ring people into church and then either creep into the back of the church for the service, or leave silently by the back door (some often drive to another church to ring again). For special events like Weddings and Funerals we may ring at the start, then wait until the service finishes to ring again, and so never even get seen.

So, next time you hear the church bells ringing, give some thought to the hours of teaching and learning that have gone into producing the sounds you hear. We won't always be perfect but we are proud to be maintaining this English tradition which we hope will be around for many generations to come.

Nature Notes

Jono Forgham

A weekend away in North Norfolk saw me recording 91 species of birds at a variety of habitats, including some rarer species such as: Pallid Harrier, Black winged stilt, Long billed dowitcher and Great northern diver.

Closer to home, I continue to survey Stocking Wood. Another sighting of the kingfisher here in mid November was a pleasing report. I have been concentrating on the leaf mining moth species.

Many tiny moth species lay their eggs on specific tree species and the larvae live between the 2 layers of the leaf, munching their way around. By looking at the tree species, the pattern (or mine) left behind and a few other features, it is possible to identify the moth to species.

Traps have also been left out until about 11pm but with the nights becoming colder, the catch is much lower. However, on the 1st November, I took 78 moths of 19 species. Certainly, a good haul.

Local walks have recorded a few winter species now arriving, such as Fieldfare and Redwing.

A walk around the tracks west of Much Hadham gave great views of kestrels, red kites and common buzzards whilst a splendid little egret was seen on the River Stort near the sports centre. jonoforgham@gmail.com

















The Hundred Parishes Society

Until the 19th century, education in England was mostly linked to religious institutions or funded by wealthy donors. The Education Act of 1870 made a commitment to the provision of education to all on a national scale.

The Hundred Parishes has some fine examples of schools that were founded prior to this time and continue to educate young people today.

Felsted School was founded in 1564 by Richard Rich, the first Baron Rich. Under Henry VIII, he accumulated immense wealth whilst overseeing the dissolution of the monasteries, and he was later appointed Lord Chancellor of England under King Edward VI.

Dame Joyce Frankland, 1531-1588, lived at Rye House in Stanstead Abbotts, the wife of the lord of the manor. Her son was killed by a fall from his horse. In her will, Dame Joyce remembered him by providing funds for the education of

boys at many locations including the "ffree grammar schole" in Newport, now The Joyce Frankland Academy.

St, Edmunds College in Standon parish is the oldest Catholic college in England. The main building dates from 1769. The school chapel is Grade I listed, built in the mid-19th century and designed by A.W.N. Pugin whose best-known work is Big Ben, the clock tower of the Houses of Parliament.

Some schools built after 1870 have adopted the names of notable locals. For example Leventhorpe Academy in Sawbridgeworth was established in 1965 and named after the Leventhorpe family. Sir John Leventhorpe died in 1625 and has one of the finest memorials in Sawbridgeworth

parish church.

Ralph Sadleir School in Standon was founded in 1971 and named after Sir Ralph who was born in 1507 and knighted in 1543 by Henry VIII. When Queen Mary I came to the throne, Sir Ralph retired to live quietly in Standon.







I had a Mum who loved make up too... at one time we both joined a cosmetic

company where we visited people's homes and gave the females a new, better looking face! I can hardly believe it myself, but the truth was that the improvements were so overwhelming. that we sold loads of the products!

Many years have passed and I've tried and tested countless brands of cosmetics... at one time I was in public relations and part of my job was receiving, and testing a very up-market product. It was then that I decided that maybe the perks were not worth the life style... and I switched back into 'proper' journalism!!

So back to the here and now... with a face, for once, devoid of a scrap of make up, it is time to go to the hospital. Wish me luck!

PS One week later

Other than the fact that I look as if I had gone ten rounds with Henry Cooper, things are going along OK. I go back to have my poorly eye area checked this week and, again, in three weeks to see the specialist.

I have since wondered if it was worth all this as I'm not exactly in the first flush of youth... but a cancer is a cancer and I think I'd rather know it was out rather than lurking around and getting worse!

So if you chance to see me around, with a face which is grossly unappealing, give us a smile. The surgeon told me mine was the most common cancer... so who knows who could be next!!
