Father Simon Our Assistant Area Dean writes:

Near the start of the musical 'Rent', the song 'Seasons of Love' asks the question 'How do you measure a year?'


The song initially answers that question with a fact - 525.600 minutes. But the song then goes on to suggest other ways we might measure a year: in the number of daylights, of sunsets, of midnights, in the number of cups of coffee. Or perhaps in inches, in miles, in laughter, or in strife.

So how do you measure a year?



After all, time's a strange thing, Sometimes it seems to rush on but at other times it crawls by slowly. We often want more time, or we regret its passing. But then sometimes the importance of a moment - for instance a birth, a proposal, a death - has some value beyond time. no matter how long it lasts. The moment has a depth of meaning that stays with us, even though the minutes pass. In those moments, are we being offered some insight into what it is to live in eternity?

Of course, our perceptions of time aren't always modified by good things; I'm sure vou'll remember how many people's experiences of time changed during the long days of the pandemic lockdowns. It's something which is picked up in the song 'Seasons of Love', which suggests that a year in a life can also be measured by the difficult and even the worst of times - 'In truth that she learned or in times that he cried, in bridges he burned or the way that she died'.



simple minutes, hours and days of such pain, creating the unthinkable possibility of new beginnings, new relationships, or new life - even from the worst of all situations or experiences.

The suggestion that a life can be measured, not in the number of minutes or years survived, but in terms of the characteristics or qualities of a life echoes the Bible's gospel of St John. John argues that life can be more than just an existence: it can be experienced - even when things are bleak - in all its fullness in the company of Jesus, the source of all life. It's a sentiment perhaps picked up in the last lines from that song from 'Rent' which encourage us to 'remember the love' and that 'love is a gift from up above'.



In this month when we mark St Valentine's Day, let's look for love in our lives. Let's look to share love with others. Not just the red-hearted love celebrated on St Valentine's Day by lovers, but the pure, sacrificial, unconditional love Jesus displayed in his earthly life, which God now calls us to share with everybody we meet.

Little Hadham Gardening Club

Our next meeting is on **Tuesday 18th February** when we will have a Ploughman's Lunch at Little Hadham Village Hall at 12.30pm followed by a talk from George Lockwood on 'Pruning and taking cuttings'. The cost is £7 per person for members and £10 for non members, and the choice is either pate or cheese. Pruning - Regular pruning of certain trees and shrubs can increase vigour, improve fruit or flower production and ward off disease. There is no one catchall way to prune all plants. You will need to prune at different times of the year and in different ways, depending on what plants are growing, how they are grown and what you want from them. It is therefore important to research how to prune each plant before you start. Pruning at the wrong time of year, or in the wrong way, can lead to all sorts of problems, not least the plant putting on lots of extra leafy growth at the expense of fruit and flowers.

1. Pruning at the wrong time of year most plants are pruned in winter when dormant, but there are exceptions eg Cherry and Plum trees. Likewise most spring flowering shrubs should be pruned immediately after flowering.

2. Pruning too much - pruning removes stems and leaves which are the two main sources of food for the plant. Removing too much material at once can result in die back of the roots and it may take several years for the tree to recover.

3. Pruning above a node- the node is where leaves, buds and shoots emerge from the stem. You should always cut

just above a node, as this prevents 'die back' and therefore disease. Also you can manipulate new stems, leaves or flowers to form in a desired direction as nodes form on different sides of a stem. Do not cut too closely above a node as this can damage it, but avoid leaving more than 1cm above the node as you will leave an unsightly stump.

4. Cleaning secateurs - clean, sharp and well ordered pruning tools function better, last longer and are safer to use than those which are dirty and blunt. If you don't sharpen secateurs and loppers then you are less likely to make a clean cut and a messy cut will take longer to heal and could let in disease.

5. Pruning at an angle - when pruning branches it is important to cut at a downward angle so that when it rains, water runs quickly off the wound. By cutting flat you run the risk of fungal infections entering the plant, as water can pool in the wound to create the perfect conditioner for fungi to take hold.

6. Removing 'die back' - there are several causes of die back, including bad planting, bad pruning, frost damage and physical damage (where branches rub together). Sometimes fungi can invade these dead shoots and cause canker which spreads to other parts of the plant, potentially weakening it. It is therefore important to prune out die back to prevent disease. 

Damp and mould has built up in our home over the winter. It started around the windows but now it's spread. I've been chasing our letting agency, who say they'll speak to our landlord but there's been no action and I'm really worried about how this might affect our health. Our tenancy agreement isn't up for six months, what can I do?

You've done the right thing by reporting the issue to your letting agency. It's not always easy to work out the cause of damp and mould, and your landlord might suggest that something you're doing is contributing to it. However, your landlord will be responsible for the issue if it's being caused by structural problems or disrepair such as a leaking roof or bad insulation.

Damp is when an area of your property doesn't dry out, often because it's cold. Damp can lead to mould, which is a fungus that grows in areas where warm damp air condenses on cold surfaces, like window frames. On our website you can find information which will help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do about it. You should also check your tenancy agreement for mentions of repairs and damp.

Your landlord is responsible for fixing a damp problem if it's making your home unsafe to live in. For example, this could be if it's affecting your health or the health of someone living in the property with you. Your landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, for example if the roof is damaged. They would also have to cover the cost of repairs to any items damaged by the damp, including carpets and furniture. One of the things that can contribute to damp and mould is condensation. One of the best ways to prevent condensation is to keep homes well-heated and ventilated, but high heating costs and cold weather can make this difficult for lots of us. If you're finding it hard to insulate and heat your home, check our website to see if you're eligible for support.

There are steps you can take to make sure you're not contributing to a damp problem, and making it worse. Our website has advice on what to avoid, like drying clothes on heaters, blocking air vents, or using portable gas heaters. However, showering, cooking, and laundry are the kinds of things everyone expects to be able to do in their homes. If the property can't be heated and ventilated adequately to cope with normal day-today living activities, then it's the property that's the problem, not your behaviour.

If your landlord is responsible for the damp in your home but doesn't do anything about it, there are steps you can take, like reporting them to the local authority. And as a private renter, if you've got evidence from a health professional that damp is making you ill, you may be able to get free legal advice through Legal Aid.

As a last resort, you might decide you just want to leave the property but getting out of a tenancy agreement early can be difficult. There's information on our website about how to go about this but remember this can be hard and there might be things you haven't tried yet.

With our AGM in April, it is with some urgency that we need to find a new Chairman. I have been Chair of Little Hadham Village Hall for eight years now and with the support and invaluable input from other members of the management committee, many improvements have been made to the village hall to help secure its future. It has always been my personal choice to be a regular volunteer to support groups such as Air Frver, Community Breakfast, Red Chair Cinema, Welcome Café, Bereavement group, Basic Cooking Skills and Digital Workshop. It would be up to the person who is nominated and voted onto the management committee as Chair to decide with other management trustees what roles and responsibilities need to be reviewed to best suit the needs of the Village Hall and the level of commitment that a new Chair is able to offer.

The management committee is made up of five elected members: Chair, Vice-Chair, Bookings Secretary, Treasurer and Minutes Secretary. The other 9 positions available on the committee are usually filled by being nominated by the user group they represent, as outlined by the village hall's constitution.

Below is the current list of Roles and Responsibilities of the Chair. If you think that this is a role that you would be interested in taking on, please get in touch. Ideally, the person who takes over the role, will be someone who lives within the eight hamlets that make up the Parish of Little Hadham.

CHAIR - Roles & Responsibilities Role of the Chair

 Good leadership skills and have experience of committee work

- Have tact and diplomacy and good 'people' skills
- Be impartial and respect confidentiality particularly with respect to matters that relate to individuals
- Represent the organisation at meetings and act as spokesperson as appropriate
- Monitor that decisions taken at meetings are implemented
- Make informed financial and strategic decisions to meet policies and priorities in the best interests of the charity
- Decisions are in accordance with agreed management committee plans.
- Consider the use of 'Best Value' and 'Best Practice' methods and techniques to gain good results

Chair Key Responsibilities

- Plan and prepare the committee meetings and the AGM with others as appropriate.
- Chair committee meetings ensuring:

- A balance is struck between timekeeping and space for discussions

- Business is dealt with and decisions made
- Decisions, actions and deliberations are adequately minuted

- The implementation of decisions is clearly assigned and monitored

With management trustees, keep policies and procedures under review

- Keep an overview of finances
- Research and apply for grant funding and support others that undertake this work
- Prepare and submit end of grant reports as required
- Oversee the organisation of fundraising events with others as appropriate
- Communicate activities and events via monthly Parish News
- Liaise with outside agencies in support of VH objectives
- Attend meetings of CDA and other influential bodies as appropriate
- Maintain a Business Plan with others as appropriate
- Maintain and recruit prospective committee members
- Ensure that a successor is found before the term of office finishes.

Premises Update

The heating repairs are now complete, and the village hall is now warm and toasty, having had all the radiators and pipework replaced. Thank you to everyone for bearing with us while essential repairs were carried out. We are now looking into whether it would be possible to refurbish the main hall floor or if we are looking at a far more expensive project of taking up the old floor and replacing it with a completely new one.

The Hundred Parishes Society Tricia Moxey

Enjoying a winter stroll along any of the described walks within the Hundred Parishes provides an opportunity to view the landscape features visible from various vantage points. Much of this countryside has been farmed by many successive generations as these custodians of the land have raised livestock and garnered variable harvests of grain. The spring of 2024 was rather wet, and this resulted in poor establishment of autumn-sown cereals. This, combined with the inclement conditions during harvesting, resulted in disappointingly low yields.

However, it seems that with dry weather in the autumn of 2024, the sown wheat, barley and oats have germinated well, with most fields now covered with fresh green shoots. Many farmers have decided to cut back on growing oil seed rape, and they may choose to plant alternative niche crops such as sunflowers or borage once the weather is warmer.

These farmed landscapes have traditionally supported assorted wildlife including skylarks, rooks, ladybirds, bumble bees, butterflies, badgers and foxes. In addition, well-maintained soils contain not just beneficial fungi, but a variety of earthworms and beetles which in turn provide food for many other creatures. Sadly, other lesswelcome creatures such as slugs and root-eating beetle or fly larvae are also present. Seeing a sizeable flock of birds following a plough demonstrates this plethora of food!

of insect life, especially pollinators or those that eat aphids, is encouraging farmers to find ways of enhancing habitats for insects by leaving marginal strips round fields for wildflowers, planting new hedges or creating beetle banks within their fields. These features may be visible from footpaths during the winter months so make a note of where they are and plan return visits during the summer to observe them full of flowers and other wildlife.


