At this time of year, I always get asked whether I'm going to be making any New Year resolutions. Yes - I have. And - yes - it's hopefully one we can all make.

Besides being a follower of Jesus, the world defines a Christian as someone who feeds the hungry, someone who clothes the naked, and someone who visits the sick and those in prison. They're aims derived from the latter third of chapter 25 of Matthew's gospel.

Of course, we can't help everyone, and there are plenty of schemes. benefits, organisations, and charities who do wonderful work in supporting those in need. But it can also be too easy to think, "That's not my job. They're not my responsibility!" After all, on many occasions, a person doesn't need an organisation or a programme to help them. They simply need a sympathetic ear and a prayerful response. They simply need a little bit of our time. It's true, as I say, that we can't help everyone. But that should never stop us from helping someone. It's our Christian duty to care, and God is disappointed when we fail to help our fellow human beings if it's in our power and ability.

So, that's my New Year resolution which we hopefully might all be able to sign up to.

Please pray for me as I go about my ministry, as I pray for you.

Parish Council update

The Parish Council have had a successful 2023 and have a lot of exciting plans for 2024. We have secured funding for a number of Village projects, including improvements to the community orchard, village pump and chalk stream and points of interest boards, which we hope will benefit each of the Village Hamlets.

There has also been a lot going on down at the allotments. All of the plots are now taken and hopefully everyone will have a very successful Spring planting. If you are interested in taking on a plot, please do speak to Councillor Westlake who will be

able to place you on the waiting list.

Other achievements this year include work at the layby opposite Hadham Hall to clear it of fly tipping and arrange for CCTV and signage and we have just held a very successful festive village drinks event. We have also reignited our good working relationship with Herts CC Highways department and continue to work towards highways improvement in the village, including speed reduction measures on the old A120.

All that remains is for me to thank all the Councillors (and especially our trusty clerk Carole) for their hard work throughout the year and wish you all a happy and healthy 2024! Councillor Kent (Chair of Little Hadham Parish Council)

Parish Council Meet and Greet - held in the Village Hall on Sunday, 10th December 2023

There was a good turn out of 24 villagers who attended from the Ford, Bury Green, Albury Road, Acreman Street, Church End, including some children.





Issues raised were how to protect trees in the parish and about the 120-year-old oak cut down in Mill House Field. Also, how to find out about the Sign of the Times festival and express their views. A suggestion to get the event organiser to a PC meeting in the new year.

This event provided an opportunity for villagers to meet with the Parish Council, Village Hall Committee members and chat amongst themselves, whilst enjoying festive refreshments.

Round Up of 2023

Litter Picking grant ceased – 31st March 2023

The village no longer has a paid litter picker, so it's up to us all to monitor our area and pick up any litter as we see it. You can always join the 'Adopt an Area' scheme, which is run by East Herts Council. They will provide you with a litter grabber, high viz jacket and rubbish bags. East Herts Council continue to empty the rubbish bins, but do not pick up litter.

Stansted Noise Action Plan – Little Hadham Parish Council responded on behalf of the village:

The Parish is under the noise preferred routes for departures on 22 and arrivals on 04. LHPC considers the noise action plan ("NAP") to be deficient in three aspects:

- 1. Noise is considered in absolute terms rather than the direct impact on households.
- LHPC urges Stansted to prohibit with immediate effect the use of the noisiest aircraft (QC4) on night flights.
- LHPC does not understand how a NAP can be proposed and yet fail to materially take account of the airspace modernisation programme in progress. In LHPC's opinion, the NAP will be out of date within months as a result of airspace modernisation.

First Apple Pressing Day - September 17th in the Community Orchard

A good turnout of enthusiastic people for the apple pressing day. Was a very good day and something we will do next year. Residents turned up to see what was going on. This will be repeated in 2024.

Post Bypass update

Speeding down the old A120 is clearly the biggest highways issue for the villagers and potential ways forward are under discussion: including pinch points, chicanes, and speed cameras. These measures are proposed to be completed within a year - and would be a reasonable timeframe for speed reduction and traffic calming measures to have been put in. So, watch this space. Other areas being looked into include a potential pedestrian crossing at the Smithy and consultation on further works to the crossroads.

Fly tipping

There has been a lot of involvement with the enforcement officer.
There is now a sign up on the A120 layby to say there is CCTV.
Apparently if an area is clean and tidy it is less likely to be dumped.
Talk about getting the layby adopted by the village, perhaps a competition as to who has the cleanest layby compared with other villages. Cllr Mardell is currently clearing the layby to keep it tidy.

UK Prosperity Grant - £13,200

Little Hadham Parish Council applied for an improvement grant for various areas in the village. We were fortunate enough to be granted a sum for the following projects:

- Refurbishment of village sign and village pump, plus reflective signs on the village memorial, gateway flower boxes at the 4 entrances to the village
- Unique Information boards in all the hamlets with referencing points of interest in that vicinity, also showing routes around the parish, to inform on all areas in the village.
- Pudding stone information board
- Funding for improving the community orchard.
- Chalk stream works bat boxes, swallow boxes to be installed.
- Communal seating on green spaces
- Bus stop refurbishment
- We applied for an ACV for the Community Orchard – which has been granted.

Little Hadham Gardening Club

There is no meeting in January but please remember to put the **20th February 2024** in your diary as the next meeting is our Ploughmans Lunch.

More details next month. The Xmas Wreath workshop was well attended and an enjoyable time was had by all.

If you have recently bought a Poinsettia or been given one for Xmas the following article might be too late, but you can save it for next year.



Poinsettia, Euphorbia pulcherrima, is an attractive house plant with dark green leaves and leafy red 'bracts' that surround the green-vellow flowers in December and January. They're commonly used to decorate the home at Christmas. Native to Mexico, poinsettias can be tricky to keep alive after Christmas and most are thrown away after the red bracts have faded and the festivities have ended. However, with a little care and attention it's possible to keep your poinsettia alive throughout the year and even encourage red bracts and flowers to form in time for the following Christmas.

How to grow poinsettia

Grow poinsettia in a draught-free spot with bright, indirect light and a temperature of around 13-15°C. Water sparingly, typically when the surface of the compost has started to dry out. Mist the leaves and bracts regularly to increase humidity and keep the colourful bracts looking their best for longer. After Christmas, feed your poinsettia monthly with a high potash liquid feed, such as a tomato feed.

If buying your poinsettia from a garden centre or supermarket, make sure it's in good condition and that no leaves are wilting, as wilting leaves can be a sign that they've been stored in too-cold conditions. Avoid buying poinsettias that have been displayed near a door or even on a petrol station forecourt – they simply won't last.

Take care to ensure it's well protected on the journey home, making sure its delicate leaves aren't exposed to freezing temperatures – ask the shop assistant to wrap it up or cover it in a plastic bag if you need to. Don't leave your poinsettia in the car for longer than is absolutely necessary as temperatures can quickly tumble and your poinsettia will suffer.

Place your poinsettia in a bright, draught-free spot out of direct sunlight, ideally with an average temperature of 13-15°C. Keep it away from windows, where temperatures can drop significantly at night, and from doorways and open fireplaces, which can be draughty.



Water only if the surface of the compost is dry, and continue to water sparingly. Increase humidity by spraying gently with water every few days. This will help keep the leaves and bracts in tip-top condition. Dust the leaves as and when you need to, to keep your poinsettia looking its best but also ensuring its leaves can photosynthesise properly, so it remains as healthy as possible.

Problem solving

The most common problem when growing poinsettias is that the leaves wilt and drop off. This is a sign of cold conditions. Remember poinsettias are from Mexico and need to be kept at a minimum temperature of 13°C, away

from draughts (including near doors, fireplaces or single-glazed windows). Unfortunately, some poinsettias are kept in poor conditions in the shop or garden centre, and the leaves start to wilt when you get them home. Sadly there's not much you can do for your poinsettia at this stage. Always buy your poinsettia from a reputable supplier and remember to protect it from cold conditions on the journey home.

Other problems, such as grey mould, can result from over-watering. Make sure you water your poinsettia only when the surface of the compost is dry, and mist the leaves regularly to maintain humidity around the plant.









A pleasing attendance made this a really wonderful occasion to kick start the Christmas period.





Nature Round Up from 2023

A lot of my time has been spent in Stocking Wood this year so I thought I would round off 2023 with a selection of photos from this superb habitat where I have now recorded over 950 species of everything apart from lichen and mosses, which I shall be tackling in the forthcoming months.

I have come across several rare for Herts creatures and one that I found earlier this month that is rare on the national scale, a 4 Spotted Ladybird, Nephus quadrimaculatus. This is invariably found on ivy.

When the survey concludes, sometime in early Summer, I am anticipating a total of in excess of 1500 species of birds, flora, insects, fish and aquatic invetebrates along with centipedes etc. So far, been a really enjoyable time finding so many creatures. Photos here of a few rarer ones for East Herts.

















St Cecilia's Church Bells

Did you know that there is an annual Japanese buddhist bell ringing ceremony?

It follows Japanese custom in which the 'end of the year bell' ("joya no kone", translated as "bell bring in the light") is stuck 108 times before midnight on New Year's Eve.

Symbolically it welcomes in the New Year and represents the purification of the 108 mortal desires / human faults (bono). It is a huge single bell with many inscriptions which include Buddhist texts containing information about the bell's creation, such as the artists name. date it was cast and the temple it is from. There is a reinforced spot on the bell for a large wooden pole (similar to a telegraph pole) to strike - the spot is often decorated with a Buddhist lotus or chrysanthemum motif. A horizontal wooden pole is suspended by ropes to the ceiling and is pulled back and also has many ropes attached to


allow it to be rung. There is a team of Monks, each with a rope that pull the pole backwards and forwards without ever touching the bell. Only on the command of the Abbot, the head of the Monastery is the bell finally struck, when he also pulls on his rope with all his might to allow the bell to be struck. Through the 2 hour plus ceremony the Monks chant and a service is given.

The sound of the bell changes depending on how the bell has been struck, it often resonates with a gentle hum that lasts for a period of time after the bell is struck.

Wishing you all a very happy New Year, and, if any of you out there wish to try English church bell ringing, don't just put it on your 'to do' list, DO it!





The Society's website has been updated although it retains the name **www.hundredparishes.org.uk**

The most significant change is the addition of a section called Articles. This section consists of about 80 pages and offers a window onto more aspects of the Hundred Parishes, complementing the existing introductory pages to parishes, walks, people, what's on, etc.

The Articles section comprises a series of short essays on a diverse range of subjects ranging alphabetically from Almshouses to Workhouses. Most of the articles started life as a submission to local parish magazines; most have been expanded. We have introductory articles about the Hundred Parishes Society's origins, aims and activities. Other topics include Aviation, many aspects of Churches, Landscape, Listings, Museums, Parish names, Pub names, Village halls and Village signs – and many more. Has the time come to tax Aviation Fuel?

World leaders representing 198 countries gathered in the United Arab Emirates in early December with the aim of agreeing meaningful action to combat climate change.

The occasion was the COP28 summit. These climate summits are held annually but they rarely manage to agree tangible measures to tackle global warming. Unsurprisingly, the oil-producing countries are reluctant to kill their golden goose but they are not alone in resisting measures to reduce the use of fossil fuels. The aviation lobby is equally culpable.

So, when EU representatives arrived at the COP28 summit with a proposal to tax aviation fuel on international flights, there was an outcry from the aviation industry.

An international treaty (the Chicago Convention) signed in 1944, prohibits any country from taxing aviation fuel for international flights. International air travel was still in its infancy in 1944 and there was minimal awareness of global warming. However, air travel has mushroomed since 1944 and is now the fastest growing source of CO2 emissions.

Today, airlines continue to be exempt from fuel duty and VAT. In the UK, passengers pay Air Passenger Duty (APD) and this raised £3.1 billion last year. However, if airlines paid fuel duty and VAT at the same rate as

the motorist, this would cost them £9.7 billion. APD would need to be more than three times its present level to create a level playing field between air travel and road travel.

Higher taxation on air travel would dampen the demand for flights and thereby reduce CO2 emissions and help to combat climate change. Nobody likes tax increases and so any increase in APD would be strongly resisted by voters, as well as by the aviation industry.

On the positive side, the Government could use the £billions of additional APD revenue for the NHS or other public services, or to pay for tax cuts in other areas. On the negative side, if we continue to give huge tax subsidies to the aviation industry and allow it complete liberty to expand year after year, we may not win the battle against climate change.

It is very unlikely that the COP 28 summit will produce an agreement to tax aviation fuel. However, when international agreement cannot be reached it may be time for the UK to show leadership.
