Oh My God, Oh My Word!

The phrases above are widely used worldwide; in pain, joy, football and generally. These are expressions from the heart. It is often used interchangeably, especially as media censors or mutes the word "God", prompting people to use the alternative "oh my word". Amazingly, the bible says in the Gospel of John "in the beginning was the Word and the word was God". That Word is Jesus. Oh, my Jesus!

I sometimes wonder why in our bid to be 'politically correct', phrases that relate to God are muted or censored. Did God offend us? Why is God being blocked in our part of the world, but encouraged in other parts of the world, where for example "by God's grace" is a free everyday expression and nothing to be ashamed of. Do you recall back then when the phrase Deo volente (DV) was used freely?

Why is there now, a systematic attempt at erasing of the use of God's name?

Why is God blamed for the world's wrongs but not credited for its progress and beauty? There is frequent discussion about not judging others, but this raises a question about how we view God. We often assign blame to Him but may not express gratitude and give Him credit for what we receive.

As we engage in gardening this season, it is important to reflect on the factors that cause a seed to sprout and bear fruit. How does the earth facilitate this transformation, and from where does it derive its capabilities? While "Mother Earth" is often credited with life and beauty, it is essential to consider her as part of God's creation. Can the earth independently produce food and beauty without divine influence? This notion seems improbable.



In the book of Genesis in the Bible, God did say: Let there be plants, including the seas and water bodies and the skies!

We are a remarkable creation.
Our uniqueness suggests a
distinguished origin, highlighting
your significance as a gift to the
world. Take a moment to appreciate
the beauty of nature around you.

Everything is indeed bright and beautiful, with all creations attributable to their source – God Almighty. It is essential to acknowledge this in our daily interactions and ensure that recognition is given where it is due. Just as we protect our copyrights and innovations to prevent others from taking credit for our efforts, we should also ensure that God receives the appropriate acknowledgment for His creations, thereby respecting His rightful recognition.

Let us articulate this appreciation with respect and admiration in our conversations.

Which came first, the hen or the egg? God made the hen, and the hen started to lay eggs.

God is the source and should not be relegated.

Revolt.

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Support Our Parish Council

- a personal view

I support our Parish Council. I have done so since I moved to Little Hadham just over 12 years ago. I regularly attend Parish Council meetings. I regularly attend the annual Parish Assembly. I have been involved in two Parish Council projects, the Neighbourhood Plan from 2015-2018, and the Drive Safe Scheme 2016-2018. I have also attended the two Parish Council 'Meet & Greets' in December 2023 and December 2024.

I like to think that I do my bit for the village in other ways. I have been a Governor at our 'outstanding' primary school for 7 years. I have also been a volunteer at the Village Hall for the past 5 years, and on the Committee for 4 years. I also raise money for the Village Hall.

Since I have lived in Little Hadham, interest in our village from residents has declined. Attendance at Parish Council meetings has gone from nearly 50 at my first meeting in February 2013 to a regular average of sometimes less than 10 over the past couple of years. The annual Parish Assembly used to be attended by around 80 people, sometimes more, until COVID. In 2022 there were 25 in attendance, in 2023 - 18, and in 2024 - 9. A few weeks ago there were just 13 people present.

We need a Parish Council, and we need to support them. Over the past couple of years or so, they have achieved a lot on our behalf -

- Working with Highways to try and resolve speeding issues in the village
- Working on plans to improve the safety, and the turning of vehicles at the traffic lights
- · Repairs to the war memorial
- Development of the allotments
- New information boards and benches around the hamlets
- Having regular updates from our local EH District Councillor. Our recently newly elected MP was invited to a meeting which he attended, as did our new Herts County Councillor

 A new zebra crossing and bus stop near The Smithy, and resurfacing of the C15 road close to it.

And let us not forget that the Parish Council responds to serious issues. In April 2019 when travellers set up homes at Westland Green, the issues were aired with District Councillors, who promised support for Westland Green residents who complained at the Parish Assembly. Even though appeals failed, the Parish Council listened.

The recent music festivals at Bury Green and Church End highlighted safety issues, and how licences were granted. Angry residents complained and the Parish Council listened to concerns and responded. Representatives at County level were invited to a meeting to be questioned about the problems caused by these music festivals. This pressure has led to the cancellation of the music festival to be held this summer.

The recent idea of building homes on the field opposite the school drew a bigger attendance of 41 at the Parish Council meeting in February. And, to put all this into context, for the past two years there have been two vacancies on the Parish Council. One has recently been filled, and there should be another 2 or 3 more to increase the numbers to what they were a few years ago.

I am not surprised that the Parish Council wrote in their Parish News article in May, 'Shame there is not more interest in our village.' If there was no longer a Parish Council, we would have no voice in what happens in our village'. I agree with this. At the meeting in May, three people, including myself, said a few words in support of the Parish Council.

Of course, the Parish Council should not be immune from criticism. If you belong to any Committee, you may have to answer awkward questions at times, or justify why you made a decision. It does go with the territory. I have been on three committees recently, and I still serve on one. Every Parish Council meeting has an item called 'Public

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Issues' where residents can have their say. I have often expressed my opinion as other residents have done, and still do. This is what should happen in a village where residents want to see the Parish Council succeed on their behalf. It is always better to raise issues personally, complain about something, and promote some discussion about what to do about it. It is even better to 'step up' and get involved as I have done.

However, the Post Office closure two years in April 2023 led one resident to write a short article in the Parish News criticising both the Parish Council and the Village Hall for not doing enough to stop this from happening. The author also wrote that 'there was no consultation'. This was untrue as it had been discussed at many Parish Council meetings over several months before this decision was finally made. From late 2022 when the Doctor's Surgery decided to end its lease, this issue was discussed. Residents who attended all of these Parish Council meetings asked questions and expressed their opinions about this. It was only in April 2023 that the decision to close the Post Office was then made. Over the previous few months, many residents were aware of this situation and what was likely to happen. Many more could have attended these Parish Council meetings.

I spoke to the author of this article. I learned that he has not attended Parish Council meetings for many years. He has not attended Parish Assemblies either. He also did not attend any Parish Council meetings when this issue was discussed. He did not speak to the Chair of the Parish Council about this either. Equally as bad, had he done a small amount of research he would have discovered that Charity Commission rules on insurance, especially Employers Liability Insurance, are very clear.

The Village Hall is a Registered Charity, and must comply with these rules. This was the main reason the Post Office had to close. I was not happy about the closure either because the Post Office was a focal point in the village. But, I attended Parish Council meetings with others, and listened to the discussions about this.

The Parish Council chose not to respond

to this article, which I believe was a shame. Many residents will have believed what he said as there was no other story in the Parish News about this. In my opinion. this article damaged the reputation of the Parish Council. I believe that it led to more people deciding not to attend meetings, and it may have discouraged others from becoming Parish Councillors. Twice over the last few months, two Parish Council meetings have come close to being inquorate due to the lack of councillors in attendance. It is also sad that an individual chose to take out his anger about a decision in this way, instead of attending Parish Council meetings, and joining in with the discussions about this issue. Three councillors were unable to attend the meeting in June, and so once again, this meeting was close to being inquorate.

I accept that we all have the right to express our opinions. But this is not the way to do it. The Parish Council does consult residents. It always has done. There are no secret decisions. There is a lot to discuss about the future. A new Neighbourhood Plan Group has been set up. I wish them well, and I look forward to regular updates about their progress at Parish Council meetings. I also look forward to reading the finished plan, and casting my vote in favour of it in the near future. I am sure there will be open, honest and transparent discussions led by the Parish Council about how many, and where, new homes may be built. There will also be other projects to discuss which may come out of the Neighbourhood Plan. This will be an opportunity for residents of all ages to become more involved in our village. I hope that many more do so.

So, my message is this - support the Parish Council, show an interest in the future of our village, and turn up to Parish Council meetings. Step up and get involved as well, not just with our Parish Council but with the Village Hall which also needs more volunteers.

Please don't write inaccurate articles about the Parish Council and the Village Hall. This is unfair, unhelpful, and serves no purpose at all.

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Millennium Wood

Summer is now fully upon us, and the wood is looking very lush and green this month and is now bursting full of life. I've been going in the early mornings, sitting with the dappled sunlight shining through the leaves. listening to the birds out in force. Most noticeably, family of wrens singing their hearts out throughout the wood. There are also baby robins, blue tits, and great tits all chirping and flitting around. Blackbirds scuttling through the undergrowth. Treecreepers scurrying up and down the trunks. And the odd voice of the song thrush, trill of the blackcaps, and the chiffchaffs calling out their names.

The butterflies are started to emerge too. I've seen a number of speckled wood and also some meadow browns. Lots of ladybirds out this year it seems as well.

Given all the recent hot and dry weather, the pond had started to dry up, but we've filled it back up and it is now a much needed cool water spot in the middle of the wood. There are still some yellow flag irises out in flower. And buttercups are providing a lovely carpet of colour around the pond.

The wood pretty much looks after itself at this time of year. Apart from any necessities, we leave it alone for all the wildlife, providing shelter, food, water, and a home to many of them. It is also a much needed shady spot for us humans given the heat at the moment!

I thought this month I would give you an update on numbers, so here's a quick summary of our vaccination uptake.

For the Covid Spring Booster

 53% uptake, with 478 vaccinated out of 896 eligible.

The Flu vaccine has had a stronger response with

- 66% uptake 1,610 vaccinated out of 2,427 eligible.
- 1,219 of those were over 65s (which is an impressive 80% uptake)
- 391 were under 64s in at-risk groups, giving us 43% in that category.

The RSV vaccine has had the highest uptake at

 69%, with 270 vaccinated out of 391 eligible.

The Government has expressed particular satisfaction with the success of this programme. A recent UKHSA study found that it has led to a 30% reduction in hospital admissions among adults aged 75 to 79, highlighting how effective the vaccine is at protecting vulnerable groups. It's worth noting that, contrary to common belief, the RSV vaccine is a one-off, year-round offer for those aged 75 to 79. It is not restricted to autumn or the typical respiratory season.

Looking ahead, we will be holding our flu clinic at Little Hadham

Village Hall on **Saturday 4th October** 2025. The autumn Covid clinic will follow at the same venue, probably two weeks later, and I will confirm the date nearer the time.

In other news, the Jack May Trust met in May and have kindly agreed to fund additional equipment and a new air conditioning unit for the practice. We are incredibly grateful for their continued support and the generosity of the donations we receive.

One of the long-standing Trustees, Peter Brighton, has decided to step down after many years of dedicated service since the Trust's inception. His wisdom and guidance, along with the incredible generosity of his time, dedication, and the good humour he always brought to our meetings, will be deeply missed. His leadership, particularly in the early days as de facto chairman, played a key role in shaping the Fund into what it is today — and we are all the better for it.

Enjoy the summer and fingers crossed we get lots of sunshine to replenish our Vit D levels.





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


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Summer has arrived, and we're soaking up the sunshine while enjoying the cool shade of the tree canopy in the woods!

Little Hadham Gardening Club

We do not meet in July but would like to remind you all about our **Autumn Show** on **31st August**. There is a Junior Section which is split between two age groups, up to 8 years and 9-14 years. This year the classes are a miniature garden in a standard seed box, a character made from vegetables and/or fruit, a leaf collage and 6 Chocolate S'mores. If you have young children or grandchildren encourage them to have a go. It's great fun.

Gravel Gardens

Gravel gardens are an attractive way to transform part, or all of the garden, into a drought tolerant, low-maintenance display. The planting style is soft and informal, often with no barrier between planting and paths. They are ideal for

Mediterranean plants that thrive in free draining, sandy soil, such as lavender, cistus, eryngiums and phlomis, as well as bulbs and grasses, which complement these sun-loving shrubs and perennials.

Gravel gardens are low maintenance because a thick layer of gravel helps to suppress weeds. Plants that are suited to the growing conditions of a gravel garden also tend to be drought tolerant, which saves time on watering, while the gravel itself conserves soil moisture. The best place for a gravel garden is in a sunny area with sandy, free draining soil. It's hard to create a gravel garden on heavy clay soil, as gravel garden plants don't grow well in these conditions. For heavier soils, dig in organic matter and grit to improve drainage.

Use contemporary planting - Use airy, see-through plants and differing heights to create a modern gravel garden. Planting in a gravel garden doesn't need to be dense and tends to have a more informal look. Gravel can also be used to complement features such as rockeries and water features.

Gravel Garden ideas with pots - Gravel acts as a foil for plants and also looks attractive beneath container displays. The neutral shades of gravel are an ideal backdrop for colourful seasonal displays. Pots can also act as focal points in gravel gardens. If you're limited on space and only have room for one container, try creating a miniature garden in a trough or container, with plants like sedums, cacti or alpines surrounded by gravel.

Create a gravel front garden -

Incorporate a gravel garden into your front garden or driveway. It will have a softer look than hard landscaping, it provides more places to add plants and if you choose plants that attract pollinators it will also be good for wildlife. Choosing gravel over a stone driveway is also better for drainage.

Make a seating area - In a gravel garden, plants can be dotted around, in loose arrangements and planted in between path pavers. This can help to create a beautiful space for a seating area, surrounded by views of plants in all directions. Gravel can also be useful in tricky shapes where there isn't room for traditional flower beds as well as a seating area.

Gravel garden for wildlife - Add a pond to your gravel garden to help attract wildlife such as birds, frogs,

newts and dragonflies. Gravel is an attractive background for silver-leaved plants such as sage and the bright magenta flowers of rose campion.

Make a small gravel garden - Avoid buying gravel that is too big as it needs to be comfortable to walk on and small enough to blend into the background and let the plants stand out. 10-15mm is a good size for planting areas and paths. Choose a gravel colour that complements your hard landscaping or house. Look for ethically sourced gravel – some gravel is dredged from the sea. To ensure the gravel you use is sustainable, choose locally sourced gravel or recycled gravel.

What should be laid under gravel?

There are two options. It's fine to create a gravel garden on bare soil. You may get more weeds at first, but you will also get seedlings from self seeding plants such as eryngium. To help suppress weeds you can lay landscape fabric over your soil before laying the gravel. You can then cut a cross in the fabric and insert plants through it.

Bear in mind that most landscape fabric is made from plastic and some can disintegrate into the soil, increasing its microplastic load. What's more, landscape fabric can prevent water and air reaching the soil, and earthworms are not able to reach the soil surface. If you want plants to spread and self seed, don't lay landscape fabric. For an environmentally friendly option, try eco mats, which are made from organic material, bio-degradable and have the benefit of allowing more water and air through, as well as suppressing weeds.

Standon Embroidery Group



FINDING A JOB

My son and I are both struggling to find work at the moment. He's iust finished university and looking for his first job, and I'm retired but need to top up my income. We've both been sending out applications for a while now, could unpaid work help us find something?

Whether you're trying to get into work for the first time or after time off. finding a job can be really challenging.

It's always a good idea to think about what skills or experience vou could be missing for the kind of work you want, especially when feeling stuck after weeks or months of sending out job applications.

If you can afford to take unpaid work, it can be a good way to plug gaps in your CV and get a taste for different types of jobs. These sorts of roles usually come in the form of volunteering, work experience, or internships.

If you receive welfare benefits, you should check the Citizens Advice website or speak to an adviser before taking unpaid work.

And because the rules around unpaid internships are complicated, you should get advice on being paid less than minimum wage before applying to this type of role.

Volunteer roles are often welldefined and can expose you to specific types of work, whether vou're looking for experience in an office or something more practical, like supporting people in your local community. Charities, including Citizens Advice, usually have a range of opportunities available.

Being a volunteer doesn't just give you a chance to learn and improve skills that are transferable to paid work, it can also help you gain confidence and self-esteem in a professional setting, and provide structure to your day or week.

This can set you up well for job applications and interviews by showing employers you've got transferable skills, relevant experience, and are ready to enter paid work. Just like any job advert, you can find plenty of volunteering opportunities online, so it's well worth seeing what's out there if you're interested.

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The Hundred Parishes Society

The topography, geology and fertile soils of the Hundred Parishes have combined to provide suitable conditions for farming. Currently, cereals cover about two-thirds of our arable fields with crops of winter or spring-sown barley, oats and wheat. 20% of fields have been planted with oil seed rape or vegetables. Grasslands make up the remainder of fields, providing forage for cattle, sheep or horses.

Inevitably the weather influences the success or otherwise of crops. This spring has been exceptionally warm, very dry and sunny so there are concerns about a possible drought, reduced crop growth and lower yields. Some farmers started earlier than usual to irrigate vulnerable crops, and all are hoping for some more rainy days ahead as plants need moisture to absorb the nutrients they require for growth.

Healthy soils will retain more moisture; some farmers are planting 'cover crops' beneath the main crop as this will help to reduce water run-off and leaching of nutrients. Leaving wildflower margins around fields encourages assorted predators that eat pests of crops.

Many farmers diversify their activities to spread the risk: planting different crops, creating fishing lakes for anglers or converting barns for holiday lets or wedding venues.

In recent years, some have been able to realise the potential of their south-facing fields, conveniently located over underlying chalk, to plant grape vines. Guided by the results of detailed soil analysis, coupled with careful selection of appropriate species of grape, these



winemakers

are now producing first class sparkling English wines and also bottles of excellent red, white or rosé wine. Many offer tours of their vineyards as an added attraction.

Walkers following routes from www. hundredparishes.org.uk will appreciate the area's scenic beauty and rich agricultural heritage. Routes 127 and 161 pass vineyards and we should look out for other unusual crops.
