River Ash Monitoring

On Sunday 11th May, the Clerk (Carole Page) and Councillor Carolyn Westlake spent the day on a Riverfly training course on the Mimram at Panshanger Park.

We learnt how to use nets to collect sediment from the bottom of the river and then to put our findings in a white tray so that we could identify what we had found. It was fascinating to see all the various creatures, lots of freshwater shrimp and cased and caseless caddis to mention just three! The idea being that the more you find and the bigger the diversity the better quality of the water. Our samples were good, I wonder what the state of the Ash running through our village is? It would be useful to know, particularly in view of future planning applications near the river.

This course is held periodically and anyone can attend. This is the first

step in starting a Friends of the River Ash group together as we find this and other ways to collect data on the state of our precious chalk stream and how we can do our bit in protecting it.

Who are we?: Men and women from the local communities who get together to use existing skills, and learn new ones, to make and repair things There is no upper age requirement or specific skills needed but you must be over 18. We were originally part funded by Braughing Parish Council as part of its overall wellbeing strategy and we received a grant from East Herts District Council.

Where we do it?:

We meet on **Wednesdays** in a barn at Brook Cottage Farm Riding School, Furneux Pelham, SG9 0LL, from **noon until 4pm**, although you can come and go within these core hours as you please, to fit in with your life.

Our aim:

We provide a venue for local people to help relieve feelings of isolation, create friendships and offer support while working on projects and share ideas with a cuppa and cake.

We make and repair items for sale, for charity, or to support residents or village community associations to build and mend items for themselves with help as required. We do this through up-cycling using donated and reclaimed wood, pallets and other materials for projects. We may work with new materials as required. We sell the items we make in order to be self-funding whilst making financial donations to local charities. We make hedgehog houses, bat boxes, bird tables, bird feeders, bug hotels, wooden storage crates, garden planters etc., or whatever you want to make.



What do you need?:

You do not need to have any specialist skills but if you have any, they would be welcomed or you can come along and learn new skills. You are free to make whatever you want. You can either work alone or team up with others. We use tools that belong to the club that have been kindly donated and members often bring their own tools for particular projects . The club will buy tools as and when required.

What does it cost?:

The club cost £2.00 a week to go towards materials, such as nails, screws and tools and refreshments.

With all this recent sunshine Spring is now feeling much more like Summer, and the wood is all of a sudden very green. The trees are resplendent with their shiny new leaves, creating a wonderful light-dappled canopy above the wood and some much welcome shade. The ground is mostly covered with a mat of stinging nettles, a good food source for the peacock butterfly amongst others, and turns out is also good for us! The kids and I made a batch of stinging nettle pesto with the fresh new green leaves harvested from the plant last week (obviously with very thick gloves!) It turned out to be a great success, we had a lot of fun making it, and we were all positively surprised at how delicious it tasted!

The Hawthorn is now in full flower and adding a splash of white throughout the wood. You can hear the bees buzzing around it, a wonderful soundtrack of the Spring. There are a few butterflies about - we've spotted speckled wood, brimstone, and orange-tip over the past few weeks. The little ones have been spotting numerous ladybirds. And robins, blackbirds, great tits, blue tits, long-tailed tits, greater spotted woodpecker, treecreeper have all been heard if not seen amongst the foliage. There is a lot of activity as its prime breeding season and the wood is full of life. We're letting the wood do its own thing for the next few months so we don't disturb any of this wildlife. One job I have been doing though is filling up the pond. Given the recent sunny and dry weather, it has been low in water, and will keep an eye on over the next few weeks given more of the same is predicted. A moorhen is around most days I'm there which is a good sign. And given the hot weather, it's a great place to go and visit to let us all cool down in the natural shade!

Down at the Doctors

Many of you have been asking how Dr Sharif has been doing over the last few months. I recently spoke with her, and she's kindly given me permission to share her story—not only to keep you updated, but also to raise awareness for the lifesaving work of the Anthony Nolan Trust.

Back in July last year, Dr Sharif started feeling a little under the weather—just not herself. After some routine blood tests (because, being a doctor, she knew not to ignore a gut feeling), she was given a diagnosis that none of us expected: Acute Lymphocytic Leukaemia (ALL). ALL is a rare and aggressive cancer of the bone marrow and blood, usually seen in children and rarely in adults, which made the news all the more shocking—for her and for all of us.

She began treatment immediately at UCLH and has since undergone multiple rounds of chemotherapy. Many of you might remember spotting her in the surgery, calmly working away with a bright blue, 24 hour infusion bag in tow. In fact, she made a running joke of the one silver-lining—her chemo bag and tubes meant she always got a seat on the Tube during her twiceweekly trips into London. Every cloud...

Despite everything, Dr Sharif continued to support the GP team behind the scenes—handling phone consultations, reviewing blood results, and tackling a to-do list that would make most of us weep. Her dedication and resilience have been nothing short of inspirational.

Unfortunately, after her final round of chemo, she was told the treatment had not been successful. The next step: stem cell therapy. It was not presented as a choice, but thankfully, a near-perfect donor match was found abroad—an extraordinary gift, thanks to the Anthony Nolan Trust.

For those unfamiliar with the process, stem cell treatment involves high-dose chemo (and sometimes radiation) to wipe out remaining cancer cells and clear space in the bone marrow. The donor stem cells are then infused—just like a blood transfusion—and the hope is they'll take hold and start producing healthy new blood cells. This process, known as "engraftment," takes weeks to months, with the patient closely monitored in hospital for complications like infection or bleeding.

This is the road ahead for Dr Sharif, and we know you will all join us in sending her strength and good wishes. Her heartfelt gratitude goes to the many healthcare professionals involved in her care over the past year. She also hopes to raise awareness about the importance of early screening programmes for all types of cancer—something that can make a world of difference in catching disease early.

She is especially grateful to the Anthony Nolan Trust for finding her a donor. If you're not familiar with their work, please take a moment to learn more: www.anthonvnolan.org.

Dr Sharif will be taking time off to focus on her recovery, and we will all miss her dearly. From me personally—I just want to say what an incredible person she is. She's had her tough days (who wouldn't?), but she's faced everything with humour, grit, and grace. She has remained an exceptional doctor throughout it all, even while carrying a burden most of us can barely imagine.

We will be cheering her on every step of the way-and we can't wait to welcome her back.



Do you know if you have an RTS Electricity Meter? Do you know about the switch off on 30th June?

If you have electric heating, you may be one of the almost 1 million homes that have a Radio Teleswitch Service (RTS) meter. And on Monday 30 June 2025, the RTS will switch off. Unless you arrange a replacement with your energy supplier now, your heating and hot water may stop working properly.

How do I know if I have an RTS meter?

You might have an RTS meter if you:

- Use electric heating to heat your home.
- Have a tariff where the price of electricity changes at different times of day.
- Have a separate box near your electricity meter with the words 'radio teleswitch' or 'radio telemeter'.
- Have two codes on your electricity bill that start with the letter S. These are 'supply numbers' or 'S numbers'.

What do I do?

If you know you have an RTS meter or if you are not sure then **get in touch** with your electricity supplier as soon as possible, they can let you know if you will be affected or not and if so they can arrange to replace your meter.

Your supplier should upgrade you to a smart meter for free. If you can't have a smart meter, they still have to replace your RTS meter with a suitable alternative.

You don't pay anything to change your meter. If someone contacts you and says you have to pay to change your meter, this is a scam.



An example of a RTS meter is the black box on the left.

If your supplier says it can't replace your meter before 30 June 2025, you can make a complaint. Ofgem has more advice on making a complaint to your energy supplier.

What are the benefits of upgrading to a smart meter?

With a smart meter installed, you'll:

- Have more accurate energy bills.
- Be better able to lower energy use.
- Get access to money saving initiatives.

What happens if I don't change my RTS meter?

If your supplier doesn't replace your meter by 30 June 2025, your heating and hot water will likely be affected. They might:

- Stav on all the time.
- Not come on at all.

- Charge at the wrong time of day.
- Turn on and off at odd times of day.
- Not come on when you want them to.
- You might see your energy bills go up as a result.

We do not meet in June but remember to start to think about which classes you might want to enter in our Autumn Show. Pickles and Chutneys should be at least 3 months old to allow flavours to develop. Pot plants must be grown by the exhibitor for more than 4 months. There are also changes to some classes, ie Cheese and Rosemary Scones, a Swiss Roll, Bread Pudding for the men only class, and a photograph of My Garden.

Easy summer flowers

If you want more flowers in your garden, you need plants that are guaranteed to perform. But with so many plants to choose from, how do you know which plants are easiest to grow and which will give you the most flowers?

The following plants are easy to grow and will flower right through summer and into autumn – some will even give you year-round colour and interest. All the plants are perennial, so you can look forward to flowers for many summers. There are colours and shapes to suit every taste and every style of garden, and they're all great for attracting bees and other pollinating insects to your garden.



Penstemon

If you want to add some instant colour to your flowerbeds from June until the first frosts, penstemons are a great choice.

Most varieties flower for months and are equally at home in the middle of a border or growing in a pot. The tubular flowers look like small foxgloves; they come in a range of colours and are popular with bees. Grow in full sun or partial shade.

Penstemons are short-lived perennials that can suffer in cold, wet winters. Take penstemon cuttings in summer to make new plants, to replace any you lose over winter. Height: 60-90cm Spread: 50cm Flowers: June-October



Lavender

A fantastic allrounder – it can be grown in pots or in the ground, it's evergreen, with wonderfully fragrant leaves, fantastic for

pollinators and suits different garden styles, from cottage gardens to contemporary schemes. English Lavender and most hybrid types are hardy and can be left in the garden all year. French lavender is only frost hardy, so is best kept in containers and protected over winter. Grow lavender in full sun in well-drained soil. Cut back after flowering to prevent plants from becoming leggy and straggly. Height: 50-80cm Spread: 60-90cm Flowers: June-September



Salvias

Really earn their keep in the garden. The great range of forms

and colours, from electric blue to deep purple, crimson to yellow, makes them indispensable garden plants. The nectarrich flowers are magnets for bumblebees and butterflies There's a great variety to choose from, including tender bedding salvias and hardy perennials that come back year after year. They all thrive in full sun, and most flower from mid-

summer to autumn. Add gravel to the planting hole to aid drainage if you have heavy soil. Height: 40cm-1.5m Spread: 30-50cm Flowers: June-November.



Heuchera

When looking for plants for shade, you can't go wrong with heucheras. Their leaves come in an array of vibrant colours from

orange to purple, black to lime green, giving you almost year-round colour. In summer, spikes of tiny flowers, often in contrasting shades to the leaves, add to their appeal. Great in pots or as a shade-tolerant groundcover plant for the front of a border. Height: 25cm Spread: 35cm Flowers: June-August



Erysimum 'Bowles Mauve'

This is a beautiful, floriferous, woodystemmed wallflower, bearing masses of purple flowers on

tall spires, for months on end. In mild areas, it can flower virtually all year round. Grow in sun or partial shade. It's a short lived perennial but can be easily replaced with young plants made by taking cuttings. Height: 45cm Spread: 50cm Flowers: March-November.



Hardy Geranium

Easy to grow; they thrive in shade and flower for months – many until the first frosts. They have saucer-shaped flowers in shades of pink, purple, white or blue and are fantastic for pollinators such as bees and hoverflies. Grow in sun or shade. Cut back after flowering to encourage a second flush of blooms. Height: 20-50cm Spread: 30cm-1.2m Flowers: April-September



Gaura

Pretty, deciduous perennials which look great in a cottage garden or prairie border. They have small starry pink or white flowers,appearing

from early summer right through to autumn. Their delicate stems are particularly useful for linking together other plants in a flowerbed, or they can be grown in containers. They tolerate partial shade. Height: 50-90cm Spread: 50-60cm Flowers: May-November



Verbascums

Are stately perennials that are ideal for adding height and structure to planting schemes. Their elegant spires of summer flowers, in shades of pink, white, yellow, orange or even blue, look equally at home in a cottage garden or a manicured border. Grow in sun or partial shade. They are shprt-lived perennials, so it's well worth propogating them to get new plants for free. Height: 70cm-1.5m Spread: 30-60cm Flowers: June-September.

We must have shown more than 60 films under a MPLC licence to our Red Chair Community Cinema film club membership since it first started in July 2019. The MPLC licence allowed us to bring films to our members at a reasonable cost, but with some restrictions. We could not advertise the films publicly and not all the titles we would have liked to show could be licenced under MPLC. Despite this, our members have enjoyed a varied monthly film programme, the company of others, a drink from the bar and/or an ice cream treat.

Since the pandemic and with home streaming, viewing preferences have changed. Like most cinemas, we have experienced a decline in attendance which has led to the decision to change how we manage our community cinema. We will no longer be offering an annual subscription film membership for a monthly film showing on a Friday evening. We hope that our loyal members will understand the need for change, and we thank them for their support.

We are not excluding the possibility of advertising evening film screenings in the future, but to help us reach a wider audience, from September, we will be trialling a programme of regular monthly Monday afternoon relaxed screenings. The films will be provided by Moviola a Company and Charity that organises a programming and booking service for community venues across the country. This change brings with it the advantage of advertising more widely and the use of website links to promote our cinema to a wider audience. Film screenings will rely on grant funding to cover licencing costs, but the organisation of the cinema should be made easier. We will be promoting our film programme when it becomes available later in the year.



St Cecilia's Church Bells

In May we had the privilege of ringing in memory of Pope Francis for the Catholic congregations of St Joseph's, Bishop's Stortford, which is next to St Michael's Church, and Holy Cross, Much Hadham, which shares the church with St Andrew's. On both occassions the bells were half muffled, making the sound very different. The ringing was finished by the toll bell ringing 88 times, to signify the 88 years of Pope Francis' life. This replicated what had happened at St Peter's Basilica, in the Vatican, a few days before. The tenor bell at Much Hadham was also tolled

88 times on Saturday 26th April immediately before Pope Francis' 9am Funeral. Both the Much Hadham and Bishop's Stortford Catholic parishioners appreciated the event, one commented that "it was so special to hear the muted bells being rung from your church in memory of Pope Francis." I'm moving and will be renting somewhere on my own for the first time. It feels like there's so much to think about, I'm worried I'll forget something important. Do you have any advice on what I should do when looking for a new home?

Most properties available for rent are listed online or with lettings agents.

If you have the chance, renting directly from a landlord might be a bit cheaper before you move in, as they may ask for fewer references and you might not need to do a credit check. But you'll have to deal with them directly if any issues arise during the tenancy. It's worth noting some landlords use a lettings agent to find their tenants and then manage the properties themselves. If an agent is managing the property then you'll deal with them rather than with the landlord directly, for instance, if you need to get any repairs done.

Beware rental fraudsters

Remember, never pay any money before you've seen the property as this is a common tactic used by rental fraudsters. If you can, take someone with you when viewing properties for a second opinion. If repairs are being done when you view a property, it's a good idea to take pictures of the issues and follow up after the viewing with an email so you've got a record of the issues and that you were told they'd be sorted before you move in.

Things often happen very quickly when trying to find somewhere to rent

so always ask the landlord or letting agent some key questions to make sure properties you're considering are safe, affordable and meet your needs.

Key questions to ask include:

- How much is the rent? Is it payable monthly or weekly?
- How long is the tenancy for?
- Are bills included in the rent?
- Are any appliances or furniture included?
- Is there a break clause allowing any fixed term to be ended early, if needed?
- Does the landlord need a guarantor?
- Is there a tenancy deposit, how much is it, and how will it be protected?

It's also good to ask whether the tenancy is for a self-contained property, or whether there are shared facilities, whether or not it's a joint tenancy with other people and, if relevant, if you can have pets. Make sure you're happy with the arrangements.

Holding deposit?

Check if you'll need to pay a holding deposit while the landlord carries out pre-tenancy checks. A deposit can't be more than a week's rent and should be returned to you at the start of the tenancy. You should also ask your landlord or letting agent what documents

you'll need to provide when you agree to rent the property including evidence of your Right to Rent.

Avoid subletting

Avoid 'subletting' which is when you rent directly from an existing tenant, as they might not have the landlord's permission to rent to you, which could cause problems further down the line. If a tenant is showing you around the property on behalf of the landlord they should give you the landlord's contact details.

If a landlord refuses to rent to you because of who you are, this may be discrimination - for example because of your race, religion or sexual orientation. A 'no kids policy' or refusing to rent to you because you get benefits could also be discrimination. You only need to tell a landlord or letting agent you receive benefits if they ask.



The Hundred Parishes Society

We know that being outside is good for our wellbeing, both mental and physical. Besides the open countryside, we are fortunate in The Hundred Parishes to have parks and gardens where we can walk, sit and enjoy nature. I will mention just a few.

Bridge End Gardens in Saffron Walden was created by a local businessman and Quaker, Francis Gibson, in the 1840s. It is now managed by Saffron Waldon Town Council. Delights to explore include the hedge maze, rose garden and Dutch garden.

The Gardens of Easton Lodge in Little Easton have limited opening hours which can be found on our website www.hundredparishes.org. uk. They were designed by Harold Peto in 1902 for the Countess of Warwick who lived at Easton Lodge.

In Sawbridgeworth, Pishiobury Park was redesigned by Capability Brown in the 18th century as an enclosed park. It is a registered historic park and includes wet woodland, grazed fields, an oak walk, meadows and part of the River Stort.

Birchanger Wood comprises 69 acres of ancient coppiced woodland, managed and owned by the Birchanger Wood Trust. Three miles of all-weather, wheelchair-friendly paths make it easy to explore.

In Stansted Mountfitchet, the Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve is a 25 acre woodland with six man-made ponds. It was originally part of the park and garden of Aubrey Buxton's house. He was a co-founder of the World



Wildlife Trust and donated the land to Essex Wildlife Trust. Today you can enjoy circular walks passing the ponds through the wood.

June is the month when many private gardens open to the public, even groups of gardens in Duxford and lckleton – details appear on the What's On section of our website.

We hope you enjoy the summer and explore some of our wonderful parks and gardens.




