Embracing The Rhythm Of The Seasons

"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." (Ecclesiastes 3:1)

Has Autumn made a bold entrance into your life this year sweeping in briskly, bringing with it a sudden chill and the unmistakable scent of the season? Or has it arrived more gently, slipping in with soft mornings, cooler evenings, and a scattering of golden leaves along your path before you even realised?

However, it comes, one thing is certain: Autumn always arrives. With it comes a gentle reminder that our lives move in rhythms as shaped by God, the Master architect of creation. As the crowning work of His hands, each of us experiences this seasonal shift in our own way. For some, it brings the challenge of darker nights and shorter days; for others, it is a welcome invitation to don cosy jumpers, savour warm drinks, and slow our pace.

In the rustle of leaves and the softened light of shorter days, there is a gentle whisper from heaven:
Slow down. Release. Breathe deeply.
Notice the beauty that surrounds you and the beauty that dwells within.
Embrace God's rhythm for renewal.

Let us raise a toast to change, to the quiet courage of the trees, to the peace that comes from trusting God's seasons, and to the sacred art of making peace with change.

Little Hadham Parish Council - Live Streaming

At the October Parish Council meeting we trialled live streaming. Two residents logged into a zoom meeting and were able to take part in the meeting. The object of the streaming is for the meeting proceedings to be viewed by people at home and to make the Parish Council meetings more accessible.

What needs doing in Little Hadham to improve our village

A resident at the Parish Council meeting offered these suggestions:

- 1. Distribute a leaflet providing successes in our village.
- A suggestion sheet for people to give their ideas to be in the Village Hall and on the Parish Council website.
- Do we want another HadFest?

East Herts Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan

Public Consultation – Cllr Williamson responded and can tell what he knows. Joint initiative cc and eh. Designed to improve walking and cycling routes across parts of the district in order to encourage active travel. The project has been

ongoing for 2-3 years. Focused on larger towns and larger villages, so Little Hadham is not included in the schemes. The public consultation ends in November. The County Council has arranged for stalls on dates at venues across the district where the public can engage. Action: clerk to find out when the Bishops Stortford meeting is rescheduled.

Citizen Advice Bureau

- asked for a contribution. The CAB provided the stats for Little Hadham over the last year as being impressive, given the small population.
- we advised 18 people from a population of 1,200 which is 1.5 % of the population
- 2. we dealt with a total of 71 issues (3.9 issues/client)
- 3. the top three issues were benefits (31) debt (9) housing (9)
- 4. we achieved financial gains for Little Hadham residents of £19,058

Your input will be vital in ensuring the plan reflects the needs and aspirations of everyone in our parish.

How could the new **Neighbourhood Plan shape** our community's future?

The Neighbourhood Plan will play a pivotal role in shaping our community's future by ensuring that local voices directly influence how our area develops in the vears ahead. Here's how the group will make a difference:

- Community-Led Vision: The steering group, made up of local residents and parish councillors, will lead the process of creating a Neighbourhood Plan that reflects the unique needs and aspirations of our community. rather than decisions being made solely by the district council's planning department.
- Statutory Influence on **Development:** Once adopted, the Neighbourhood Plan will become part of the statutory development plan for our area. This means planning authorities and inspectors must consider its policies when deciding on planning applications, giving our community real influence over what gets built, where, and how.

- **Setting Local Priorities:** The plan can specify what types of development are needed such as affordable housing. improved infrastructure, or better public spaces—and where these should be located. It can also set design standards and identify priorities for things like pedestrian links, open spaces, and community facilities.
- Wider Engagement and **Representation:** The steering group is tasked with engaging as many residents, businesses, and local organisations as possible, using public meetings, surveys, and other outreach methods. This ensures the plan is genuinely representative and that everyone has a chance to contribute ideas and feedback.
- Ongoing Dialogue and **Accountability:** The group will maintain regular communication with the parish council and the wider community, reporting on progress and ensuring transparency. It will also act as a forum for discussion. help resolve conflicts, and keep the project on track.

In summary, the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group aims to give our community the tools and authority to shape its own future—by setting out a clear, shared vision and ensuring that any future development meets our collective needs and values.

Down at the Doctors

A big thank you to everyone who attended the flu clinic at Little Hadham Village Hall on 4 October. It was wonderful to see so many of our patients, and I am grateful to the doctors and nursing team for their hard work on the day.

In just three hours, we vaccinated 948 patients, with some also receiving the "golden ticket" of a pneumococcal vaccination where eligible.

As we prepare for the COVID-19 vaccination clinic this Saturday at the same venue, we are looking forward to welcoming our patients aged 75 and over for their seasonal protection.

A special mention must go to our fantastic car park team — Bob and Kay Kerr, Paul Barnes, and Hugh Labram — who ensured everyone arrived and left safely.

On 23 September 2025, the DHSC and NHS England introduced a new initiative called Jess's Rule.

Jess's Rule encourages GP teams to review a diagnosis if a patient presents three times with the same or worsening symptoms, or if their treatment plan is not working.

This rule is named in memory of Jessica Brady, who sadly passed away from cancer in 2020 at the age of 27. Despite having over 20 consultations in the months before her death, her cancer was not diagnosed.

What Jess's Rule means:

Re-checking symptoms: If you return three times with the same or worsening concerns, your GP team will review your diagnosis.

Better safety: It reduces the risk of serious conditions, like cancer or sepsis, being missed.

Listening carefully: Your concerns matter — you are the expert in your own body.

Top Plants for Autumn Colour



Amelanchier trees are beautiful, small trees that are attractive in all seasons. In March, the branches have star-shaped flowers, just as the coppery pink young leaves unfold. In July, the trees are studded with dark red berries. In autumn, the yellowish-green leaves turn scarlet and crimson.

Most **Asters** (now called Symphyotrichum) flower in late summer and autumn, bringing



welcome late colour to borders. Symphyotrichum (Little Carlow) is one of the best, producing vibrant, light purple flowers. Plant in a sunny, airy position to ensure maximum flowering. After flowering, cut back hard.



Known as the **Beautyberry**, **Callicarpa bodinieri var. giraldi** '**Profusion'** produces large clusters of stunning and unusual purple berries in mid-autumn, overlapping with the golden purple leaf tints and then lingering after leaf-fall.

Cercis canadensis 'Forest Pansy' is a multi-stemmed tree with purple, heart-shaped leaves which turn a

heart-shaped leaves which turn a dramatic yellow in autumn. Its deep crimson, pink or sometimes white pea-like flowers give a dramatic spring display before new leaves appear.

from bare earth
without any
leaves – hence
the common

name, naked ladies. Colchicum 'Waterlily' has striking, double flowers with pinkish purple petals.



With colourful fruits and foliage, crab apples look wonderful in autumn. **Malus 'Evereste**' is flushed with red-flushed, orange-yellow fruits in autumn that complement the orange-yellow leaves. It is an excellent tree for smaller gardens, with a pleasant conical shape.

Most **Nerines** are tender greenhouse bulbs, but Nerine bowdenii can be



grown outdoors in a warm, sunny border backed by the shelter of a wall. They will reward you with a late display of lipstick-pink flowers.



In autumn the foliage of **Acer Palmatum** turns red, orange and yellow. Grow in a prominent spot with shelter from both late frosts

and hot sunshine. The best colour is produced on neutral to acid soil.

Other plants good for colour:-

Dahlias will continue to flower until the first frosts, if regularly deadheaded and fed

Euonymus europaeus turns a spectacular shade of red before the leaves fall

Euonymus alatus also turns a beautiful crimson in autumn

Chrysanthemums flower well into autumn and are excellent for cutting

Ornamental grasses are at their best in autumn, and combine well with all kinds of perennials and shrubs





St Cecilia's Church in Little Hadham has 6 bells in its tower. The number of bells vary from tower to tower. In the Hertfordshire area we have the following;-

12 Bells in Bishop's Stortford

8 Bells in Aspenden, Braughing, Hunsdon, Much Hadham, Sawbridgeworth, Ware.

6 Bells in Albury, Anstey, Brent Pelham, Furneux Pelham, Great Hormead, Great Musden, Little Hadham, Little Munden, Stansdon, Thorley, Westmill, Widford.

3 Bells in Eastwick, Sacombe

The number of bells in a tower determines what sort of 'methods' (-music) can be played. The methods have names and follow with the following, which informs the ringer how many bells are include for example Plain Bob can be Plain Bob Doubles or Plain Bob Triples.

Minimus - means 4 bells are changing places.

Doubles - means 5 bells are changing places.

Minor - means 6 bells are changing places.

Triples - means 7 bells are changing places.

Major - means 8 bells are changing places.

The Hundred Parishes Society

On a fine September day, I caught an early train to Ware before tackling the longest walk on the Society's website. Station Walk number 18 covers 17 miles (28 kilometres) between Ware Station and Stansted Mountfitchet Station. Although I walk regularly, it was some years since I last covered that distance in a day so I carried a mobile phone just in case.

An advantage of this route is that it heads north for several miles and then turns east, so for much of the way the sun is behind to give the best views.

After leaving Ware, the route is all in lovely countryside, passing through eight of our hundred parishes:
Wareside, Standon, Thundridge,
Braughing and Albury in Hertfordshire and then Farnham, Manuden and
Stansted Mountfitchet in Essex.
Through these parishes, only Standon and Stansted contributed much more than the occasional farmhouse. They, along with Gravesend in Albury, also offered opportunities for refreshment.

The route follows a series of good paths and tracks, rising and falling between river valleys. It passes over the River Lea just after the start, spends several miles along the Rib valley, and crosses the Ash and the Stort.

The journey crosses the Greenwich Meridian, the original route of Roman Stane Street and the former Buntingford railway line. It passes



beside Barwick Ford, Standon Lordship, Patmore Heath and Stansted Windmill and there are sightings of distant churches, water towers and much more. But the best views are of unspoilt, rolling countryside and occasional wildlife.

I completed the walk, accompanied for the last 6 miles by my wife Janice after lunch in Gravesend. Altogether, a most enjoyable day – and the legs only ached a bit for the next few days! Having completed this challenge, I can return to the many shorter routes on our website.

After last winter, I'm really worried about falling behind on my energy bills again as we head into the colder months. We're careful about what we use but with small children it's hard. What can I do if I'm struggling to keep up with payments?

It's understandable to feel anxious about energy bills at this time of year. If you're struggling to afford your bills, it's important to act quickly; support is available and there are things you can do to ensure you're not overpaying.

The first thing is to contact your energy supplier - they're responsible for helping you come to a solution, like setting up an affordable repayment plan if you've fallen behind.

Energy bills can go up and down for many reasons, and if you think your bills don't look right, you should check to see if they're based on accurate readings. You might be getting estimated bills if your smart meter has stopped automatically sending readings, or if you have a non-smart meter and haven't sent a reading for a while.

If you see the word "estimated" or the letter "E" next to the readings on your latest bill, that means it's estimated. If this is the case, submit an up-to-date reading to get an accurate bill. A working smart meter does this for you, so if you have one and suspect it's not automatically sending readings, or if you'd like to get one installed, then speak to your supplier.

To help make your home easier and cheaper to heat, you might be able to apply for support with the cost of energy efficiency upgrades like insulation, a new boiler or a heat pump. Schemes like the Energy Company Obligation (ECO) scheme or Great British Insulation Scheme (GBIS) are run by energy suppliers and local councils. There are details of schemes available locally on the East Herts Council website at www.eastherts.gov.uk/community-and-health/environmental-sustainability/home-

and-business-grants-schemes-and-advice

We can help with vouchers and grants to help you pay your energy bills. These are usually for emergency situations, like if you've lost your job and can't afford to top up your meter. We can then help you to find a long-term solution such as increasing your income, reducing costs, or resolving debt issues. If you're behind on your energy bills, there are grants available and you'll need to work with us to get advice on your overall debt situation in order to access these.

If you need extra non-financial help - for example, because you're disabled or of state pension age - you can apply for support from your supplier through the Priority Services Register (PSR). Being on the register means your supplier can take readings for you if you struggle with this and there's no one else who can do it for you, and ensures your bills are in a format you can understand. The supplier will also be more sympathetic if you get behind with your energy bills. See the full list of eligibility criteria and how to sign up on the PSR website here **www.thepsr.co.uk/.**




