There's a well-known tale entitled 'The Starfish Story' which some of you may have come across.






## St Cecilia's Autumn Churchyard Clear Up & Cake Sale

Little Hadham • Ramblers

many footpaths in Little Hadham. The first walk is planned for **Wednesday**, **30th October from the Village Hall car park at 10am**. We will have a stroll/walk of up to 5 miles, at a pace that suits everyone. Depending on the interest, the frequency of the walks can be determined. #### **Highways Update**

- Traffic survey of speed and volume data to be carried out in strategic locations – We have requested this data, as it will enable other projects to be actioned.
- Greyed out Speed Signs on the A120 – most of these have now been replaced, except the one on Millfield lane at the junction with the old A120.
- Raised pedestrian crossing at the Smithy – this is currently under consideration.

- Having a Speed Indicator Device (SID) on the A120 - they have to meet a criterion. First stage gets the traffic speed and volume data to see if it meets the criteria.
- Traffic light phasing on the A120 - Currently personal Sat Nav directs people through the village as the fasted route rather than the bypass. It is suggested if the timing of the signals were changed, would make the journey through the village longer than going via the bypass and the sat nav will then suggest the bypass as the fastest route.
- Pavement clearing on the A120 – has been carried out. But will need to be monitored and reported to ensure they are kept clear and passable for pedestrians.
- HGV signs for Ford Hill Two signs have gone up advising Ford Hill is not suitable for HGV vehicles. This has been actioned due to the number of times the memorial has been damaged by HGV's and subsequently we have had to repair it with our Parish Council funds.
- **20mph at the School** We are looking at re-zoning outside the school to 20mph.

Please note that all Highways faults can be reported online. It is a very simple system and ensures all faults are reported and accountable: www.hertfordshire. gov.uk/faultreporting

It has been noted that there are people in the village that regularly litter pick our lanes and footpaths. Since we no longer get government funding for litter picking, it is greatly appreciated the great job that is being done by volunteers. The Parish Council thanks you all. Please do not litter pick on the roads and always be aware of road users.

## **Down at the Doctors**

I am incredibly grateful to the Jack May Trustees for their continued support of the practice. Colin Brookbanks, the chair, has written an article that you can read opposite. The article outlines the purchases made on behalf of the practice over the last couple of years. Recently, the Trust welcomed a new trustee, Jenny Byng, who brings both youth and extensive experience as a healthcare professional in physiotherapy.

I'll now hand over to Samantha Christos...

Hello! Most of you already know me, but for those who don't, I am Sam, and I've worked in the dispensary for 19 years. I was recently promoted to Dispensary Manager, and I now supervise a wonderful team of dispensers: Lynda, Menerva, and Pippa, who all do an amazing job. We also have a counter assistant, Suzanne, who helps with serving patients, answering prescription queries, and always greets everyone with a smile.

A bit of background on the dispensary: As a 90% dispensing practice, we serve up to 6,000 patients who can order their medication through us. On average, we dispense around 9,000 items per month. With three suppliers and two daily deliveries, it's a very busy operation, so efficient processes and good stock control are essential.

Here's how the prescription service works: We ask for three working days' notice when possible, to allow time for ordering stock and to account for any staff training, absences, or holidays. However, we usually turn prescriptions around much guicker. Prescription requests must be submitted in writing—either by placing your repeat slips in the box, emailing, or using the NHS app. We do not take prescription requests over the phone to avoid potential errors.

Now, just a little about me: Outside of work. I enjoy spending time with mv 4-vear-old son and our two sausage dogs. Maple and Pickle. I'm also a keen boxer and runner and often sign up for races to raise money for various charities. I enjoy drawing, painting, and crafting as well. I'm sure I'll see you all soon, so that's enough from me!

Lastly, please remember we are holding a mass flu clinic at Little Hadham Village Hall on Saturday, 12th October, from 8:30am to 12pm. A team of doctors and nurses will be on hand to vaccinate those eligible for a flu vaccine. The following week, on Saturday 19th October the PCN nurses will be holding a Covid Clinic from 8:30am to 5pm. You will need to book your appointment through the National Booking System—just Google "book a Covid vaccine."

#### Jack May Trust Fund for Much Hadham Health Centre. (Charity commission no. 1088104.)

After more than twenty years the Trust continues to provide facilities and equipment for the practice and it's patients, (approx. 7000). I thought that it would be of interest to give a brief update on some of the recent achievements of the fund.

#### Asthma.

This is a relatively common condition, and can sometimes , be a diagnostic challenge, requiring a number of tests and investigations. The Fund purchased a "FeNo" monitor which analyses exhaled breath to detect traces of the gas nitric oxide. If found to be present this can indicate the presence of inflammation within the lungs or airways. If taken with other information this can enable a more accurate diagnosis to be made.

#### New Doctors.

The practice has been fortunate to acquire two new doctors recently. ( Mathanaraiah & Ganandran.) We have been able to provide them with new examination couches and replace the airconditioning for the treatment room.

These are examples of the more exotic benefits afforded to the practice, but other, more mundane sundries such as ear irrigation equipment have been bought.

Thank you to all those who have supported the Trust, which, we hope, will continue supporting the practice and it's patients.

Autumn is the season for dramatic seed heads and displays of vivid fiery colour. The days are shorter and the air is fresher, but the Autumn sunshine and refreshing temperatures make revamping your outdoor space an absolute joy.



Choose some vibrant, cheerful bulbs to plant in your garden for a fantastic spring display. Lift and divide early flowering herbaceous perennials that have become less floriferous to ensure the best display for next year. Give your borders a tidy up, trying not to prune anything that can provide a valuable food source or home over winter and add a good layer of mulch to protect and improve the structure of your soil.

Plant some winter containers for some new colour on the patio. Use a mix of shrubs, perennials and winter bedding for the best displays. Include some spring bulbs too for a splash of colour later on. Great effects can be created with Heuchera, evergreen grasses and ferns.





## Samuel Betts: Farmer -Hadham Hall & Bury Green Mike Smith

Samuel was born in 1827 in Kings Langley, Herts, into a family

of well-established farmers. He appears to have spent his school years in Kings Langley, but by 1851 the census shows him travelling, and staying at the White Horse Inn in Exeter. Three years later he was in Brighton, where, on the 25th July 1855 he married Elizabeth Anne Scott 6 years his senior.

In 1842 Hadham Hall was let to John Betts of Kings Langley, and managed by him and his sons John, and Samuel. They were joined for a short time by Samuel's cousin Henry Betts. But John senior and Henry both later returned to continue farming in King's Langley. (eg in 1881 Henry was farming 360 acres in Hemel Hempstead employing 9 men and 3 boys).

The Post Office directory for Little Hadham in1855 lists Samuel and his

brother John as Brickmakers in Little Hadham, but John is also listed as a farmer. John soon died and Samuel continued with the tenancy of Hadham Hall. The Post Office directory shows him continuing to farm until his death in 1915.

In the mid to late Nineteenth Century Samuel Betts was a major character in Little Hadham. Referred to by many as "The Squire", he was the local JP, and a major employer and landowner.

In 1871 Samuel farmed and occupied 960 acres, employing 41 men, 10 women and 10 boys. In 1881 the census shows him farming 1153 acres and employing 30 men and 13 boys. At the time he was amongst the top 10 farmers in Hertfordshire occupying over 1000 acres. With falling wheat prices, the following years would be uncomfortable, but he continued successfully with assistance of the Draytons, father and son, as his bailiffs. After 30 years as a tenant of the Earl of Essex, the Hall was sold to William Minet and Samuel had to move to Lower Farm in Bury Green.



In Some Account of Little Hadham, by William Minet; "in 1842 John Betts from Kings Langley, close to Cassiobury, and so no doubt well known to the Earl of Essex, became a tenant, and in 1850 was joined by a younger brother Samuel. John died very soon; Samuel kept the tenancy, and brought the Scot line back to Hadham by marrying Elizabeth Scot granddaughter of the John Scot who had been tenant from 1780 to 1824."

Samuel continued to live on in Little Hadham with his wife Elizabeth Betts until she died in 1893. By 1911 aged 84 he was the owner and occupier of 250 acres in both Little Hadham and Much Hadham. He died on 18th August 1919, and is buried at St Cecilia's Church.

Finally, I was permitted to drive again, 7 weeks after my op. Straight away, I headed to the lagoons at Stansted Airport, where a wide variety of wildfowl and other birds were to be seen.

Highlights were Common sandpiper and Green sandpiper, whilst over the water, plenty of swallows and house martins were refuelling as they migrated south.

Another tip found me wandering around Rye Meads RSPB Reserve. Again, sandpipers were present along with a female sparrowhawk, gull species, grey heron and many duck species.

Finally, I managed a local wander over the gold course to the clubhouse and back. I was hoping to find some migrtory birds such as Whinchat and Wheatear that take time to feed upon the course in early September. Up until today (15th) I have yet to see either of these two species.

Certainly pleasing to be able to walk a little further now whilst also being able to access good sites up to half an hour's drive away.





## Millennium Wood

Millennium Wood has had a very successful late spring and summer with plenty of insects to be found around the pond. Of particular note were both the Willow Emerald damselfly and Rhingia rostrata, a hoverfly species.

The former is a recent colonist to the UK and was first recorded in Herts in 2004. I first caught a glimpse of one in MW in 2020 and it is now clearly a resident, with ovipositing (egg laying) taking place in early September 2024.

I have basically left the wood to its own growth over the last few months, with just a quick tidy up in late August. However, it now requires some fairly heavy cutting back, ready for the winter.

Sadly, my recent operation means I am no longer able to wield heavy gear such as chain saws and strimmers. Just hand tools for me.

I am planning a work party on **Sunday 13th October, 10am – 1pm**. I would be most appreciative of plenty of volunteers coming along with any tools ranging from strimmers to secateurs via loppers, bow saws, pruning saws etc. Basically, without some extra help the wood will soon become overgrown, so please do try to find time to pop along, even if you can only spare an hour. If we could muster 20 locals then all the required jobs will be completed by 1pm.

It is a privilege to ring bells for a wedding and to be a part of the couples special day (albeit we are often unseen). If you wish to give it a try, the bells are waiting for you.





### **The Hundred Parishes Society** Ken McDonald

Many of the walks on our website provide opportunities to pause and enjoy a panoramic view from a vantage point. The layout of roads, settlements, woods and fields is a visual record of many centuries of human activity.

Checking with an Ordnance Survey map, it is possible to pinpoint significant landmarks and features such as hedged field boundaries. From the 16th century, assorted records of land ownership have survived, but the most complete set of records was gathered by surveyors for the mid-19th century Tithe Awards, a forerunner of today's rating assessments for council tax and business rates.

Prepared between 1837 and the 1850's. these documents were the result of painstaking work by surveyors whose task was to map and list the details of land ownership, occupiers, size of plot and land use. Buildings, gardens and names of fields were recorded. Subsequent research by local historians has revealed that some field names can be traced back centuries, an indication of the close association of communities with the land that provided their food and opportunities for employment.

Field names are varied, some give just the size in acres while others mention specific persons such as Old Harry's Field. Some are more descriptive such as Hop Ground, Twelve Acre Pasture, Thistley Field, The Rookery, Mill Hill Field, Further Pasture, Ozier Ground and Crab Tree Field.

#### **Dear Supporter**

When I wrote to you earlier this year I explained our proposal to convert Stansted Airport Watch ('SAW') into a Foundation following approval by our members at a Special General Meeting in March. The conversion process has been protracted but we now have approval from Companies House to establish a Community Interest Company (CIC) which will be named the Stansted Airport Watch Foundation. We have also now finalised, or are very close to finalising, all the other transitional issues, including new banking arrangements.

We expect the process to be fully complete by 30 September 2024 at which time SAW will be wound up and all of the net assets will be transferred to the SAW Foundation CIC.

The SAW Foundation will have the same key objectives as the current objectives of SAW. It will be a not-forprofit entity established for the benefit of the local community. The activities of all CICs are overseen by the CIC Regulator to whom CICs must submit an annual report and accounts which, to ensure transparency, are published on the Companies House website. The CIC will have seven directors to begin with, all of whom are longstanding members of our Executive Committee.

By establishing the SAW Foundation, we will be laying down the seed-corn for the future. All of the residual net assets of Stansted Airport Watch will be transferred to the Foundation on 30 September 2024. We expect this to be in the region of £85,000 and the aim will be to protect and grow these funds over the years ahead so that, if there is a renewed threat of major expansion at Stansted Airport, funds should be available from the outset to kick-start a new campaign.

Whilst there will be a number of benefits in establishing the SAW Foundation, there will undeniably be adverse consequences from winding down SAW. We will no longer be a member organisation and so there will be no subscriptions, no newsletters, no website and no office services. Noise Complaints will no longer be via the SAW website, but via stanstednoiseline@ stanstedairport.com, with a copy to the local MP as appropriate. As previously explained, we have been struggling for some time to find the volunteers needed to maintain these core elements of SAW.

Whilst we do not envisage the Foundation engaging in any significant level of active campaigning, it will not be entirely passive. I expect that the directors of the Foundation, either individually or collectively, may wish to continue to provide occasional advice and commentary on key airport-related issues.

Ultimately, however, local district, parish and town councillors and our local MPs will need to become more directly involved in dealing with the environmental impacts of Stansted Airport. This will include dealing with local residents' concerns about the airport's activities and holding the Department for Transport and other government departments and agencies to account, as required.

It only remains for me to thank all of my colleagues, all of the volunteers and, last but not least, all of the members and supporters of SAW who have contributed to the many successes we have achieved together over the years.


