Down at the Doctors

I would like to begin by reflecting on an important development that has worked exceptionally well even though there were initial concerns and a few early challenges.

Medical Examiner Role - One Year On (Since September 2024)

A year after the mandatory introduction of the Medical Examiner (ME) role, the process has proven to be both effective and efficient. From a GP practice perspective, there were understandable concerns that the new system might slow down death registration. However, our experience has been very positive.

The ME service has worked seamlessly with practices, ensuring clear communication, timely reviews, and sensitive support for families. As a result, deaths are being registered promptly. and families are receiving reassurance and guidance throughout the process. We are pleased and reassured that this important change has enhanced quality and safety without introducing delay or unnecessary complexity.

Process for an Expected Death at Home

- **Notification** When a patient dies at home, a family member or health professional contacts the GP practice to report the death.
- Referral to the ME The practice refers the case to the Medical Examiner, providing the likely cause of death and a summary of the patient's medical notes from the last 3 months.
- ME Review The Medical Examiner reviews the referral form and medical notes to confirm the proposed cause of death.

- Family Contact The ME contacts the family to confirm key details, such as their chosen funeral director, whether burial or cremation is planned, and to ask whether there are any concerns about the care their loved one received.
- Confirmation to GP Once confirmed, the ME provides the cause of death to the GP, enabling the doctor to complete the Medical Certificate of Cause of Death (MCCD).
- Return of Certificate The completed MCCD is returned to the Medical Examiner, who then emails it to the Hertfordshire Registration Service.
- **Registration Appointment The** ME office telephones the family once the certificate has been issued, enabling them to book an appointment to register the death.

This structured, collaborative approach ensures a smooth, dignified, and efficient process supporting both families and healthcare professionals during a very difficult time.

Staffing Update

Dr Tish Ganandran will be increasing his sessions to four days a week, and Simon, our long-standing paramedic, will now be working every Monday and Friday. This additional cover is in place to support the practice while Dr Sharif undergoes treatment, expected to continue until spring next year. Although there were some donor-related delays at the start, her treatment is now underway, and we all wish her the very best in her recovery.



It feels like the seasons have definitely turned these past few weeks, and Millennium Wood has certainly started to turn autumnal. The wood feels cooler and damper after the long hot dry summer. The leaves have started to turn, acorns are littered across the forest floor, and fruits and berries are out in full force.

It is a real shame to see this behaviour in the local community asset. We have put up cameras that have been installed in the woods - hopefully though the cameras will just capture wildlife in the future rather than vandals...









Autumn Adventures with Woodland Rangers

Autumn has arrived in our forest, and our Woodland Rangers have been embracing the seasonal changes.

At the beginning of September, we wrapped up our summer holiday camp after 19 days of adventure. A real highlight was campfire cooking, where children got adventurous making bread on a stick, campfire chocolate cake even forest fudge over the fire.

This term we have returned to our after-school club at Little Hadham Primary School. The children have been getting wonderfully creative, making creatures out of conkers, leaves and other seasonal treasures. They also enjoyed building 'marble runs' for conkers and acorns using ramps, pulleys and tubes - an inventive way to combine play and problem-solving.

Our Under 5s Stay-and-Play sessions also began with a Gruffalo-themed morning. Children went on a hunt to find where the fox, owl, snake and mouse live, before making their own Gruffalo crumble, using delicious blackberries as "purple prickles."

Back to School - A Brilliant Start to the Year!

Since returning in September, school life has been buzzing with energy and curiosity across all classes. Our youngest Ash and Saplings children have settled beautifully, diving into sandcastles, mud-kitchen feasts, and playdoh ice creams while learning routines and caring for their classroom. Beech Class have been busy imagining their "dream classroom," dancing through Mondays, and enjoying their first PE and forest sessions. Lime Class jumped straight into learning with prehistoric adventures, skeleton science, and plenty of reading, showing great enthusiasm come rain or shine.

Maple Class have thrown themselves into tricky maths challenges, colourful music compositions, and autumn forest teamwork, while Willow Class are embracing their final year with gusto—tackling million-place value numbers, sparking static electricity in Science, and preparing for leadership roles. With hopes for the year ahead already shining in their letters, a trip to Bletchley Park on the horizon, it promises to be a year full of learning, discovery, and community spirit!

Our first fortnightly Empathy Assembly focused on the beautiful book My Name is a Gift: A heartfelt celebration of the names we're given. Led by four children, the whole school reflected on the stories behind our names and answered thought-provoking questions like: Do you share a name with someone in your family? How does it feel when someone says your name kindly? Our Year 6 pupils even shared the book with



our youngest children, sparking lovely conversations about the 'gifts' their names might represent. As a Rights Respecting School, we linked this to Article 7 of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, which states that every child has the right to a name and identity. We'd love to extend this reflection into your homes too – what's the story behind your name, and how does it make you feel when it's spoken with kindness?

Well, you'd have thought it was treasure they were after, the way the Green Team were digging away at the allotment this week! With shouts of excitement, out popped carrots of all shapes and sizes – some long and bendy, some short and stubby – each one greeted like a little surprise. Then came the sweetcorn, peeled back to show its golden kernels, and the peas, hiding snugly in their pods until the children popped them open. And let's not forget the pumpkins – round, heavy, and perfect for autumn and one for each class to decorate!

But the biggest "WOW!" of the day was saved for the giant sunflower head.

Truly, it was so huge you'd nearly need two people to carry it. The children

declared it the "biggest ever" – and I'd be inclined to believe them!

The allotment has given us our most successful harvest yet, and the children's laughter and muddy boots told the whole story. And here's the exciting bit: next year we'll have our very own polycrub. That means even more adventures – strawberries earlier, tomatoes for longer, and maybe even a few surprises we've never tried before.

So if this year was magic, just wait until you see what the Green Team will be pulling out of the ground next year!

The first week of September saw our hall hirers return after the closure of the village hall during August. These hall users were the first to enjoy the new main hall floor which took three weeks to install at a cost of £23.616. Last month we reported that the difficult decision had been made to change our plan for a refurbishment of the floor to a complete replacement with commercial grade luxury vinyl tiles (LVT). We are delighted with the outcome and confident that the subfloor is now very secure and the new floor has been very well received. The hall looks cleaner, brighter and bigger! Well done to the volunteers who came in at the end of August to get the curtains back up and paint the new skirting boards before hall hirers returned.

The replacement of the hall floor was one of two big projects that as a management committee we identified for attention. The second project is to commission a survey of the main hall roof which we hope will

help us put a plan in place to identify where repairs may be needed and plan for costs. Earlier in the year we had to manage a leak in the flat roof of the side extension of the village hall, so work was undertaken at that time to get it replaced.



Bell ringing etiquette: During Ringing:

Focus on the task: Conversations and non-ringing related activities should be kept to a minimum or saved for after the ringing session.

Respect the silence: Avoid talking or making distracting noises (like mobile phones) while the bells are being rung.

Listen attentively: Pay close attention to the sounds of the bells to ensure proper rhythm and coordination.

Be mindful of others: Avoid actions that could be inconsiderate to other ringers, such as bringing food into the tower or raising your voice.

Follow instructions: Adhere to the instructions and guidance of the Tower Captain or Ringing Master.

Seek permission for photos/ videos: Obtain permission from individuals and the Tower Captain before taking photos or videos of ringers or the tower.



The Hundred Parishes Society

Recently, I was privileged to watch two bats flying around my garden. They were so quick and acrobatic it was difficult to keep them in view. Bats and their roosts are legally protected so must not be disturbed. Bats are mammals, giving birth to live young. It reminded me of how lucky we are in The Hundred Parishes to have so many wild mammals in our mainly rural area.

There are several kinds of deer locally, mostly Fallow, Roe or Muntjac. Larger herds are usually Fallow deer which have "palmate" antlers, shaped like the palm of a hand. The smaller Roe deer may be seen in smaller groups – they have a white rump and no visible tail. Muntjac are smaller still and tend to be solitary; they have horns and "tusks" - downward-pointing canine teeth.

Out enjoying our latest walk, number 188, my wife and I surprised two hares who disappeared at great speed when they spotted us. They can run up to 45mph over short distances.

We regularly see foxes in our garden, usually courtesy of our inexpensive night vision camera. In the spring, we enjoyed watching the young cubs playing. Foxes seem to be a more common sight now, even during daylight, and regularly venture into built up areas. The camera occasionally spots a badger; he is usually looking for peanuts.



Anyone lucky
enough to see hedgehogs in their
garden should look after them as
their numbers are in decline. They are
nocturnal, so at dusk we should put
out a shallow bowl of fresh water (not
milk as it is bad for their digestion)
and perhaps some dog or cat food.
They may repay you by eating slugs
and insects although our experience
has been that they prefer commercial
hedgehog food like Spike's Dinner.

I'm starting to book tickets for Christmas events, but I've seen lots of stories in the news about people being left out of pocket if these are cancelled at the last minute, which is making me nervous. How can I get a refund if this happens to me?

Keep an eye on the organiser's website and social media profiles for all the latest updates. You won't be entitled to a refund if you change your mind about going or realise you can't go anymore - but if an event is cancelled, your refund rights will depend on how you bought the ticket.

If you bought your ticket from an official seller and the organiser cancels, moves, or reschedules the event, you should get a refund. The official seller is the best point of contact to ask about how to get your money back.

If you're having no luck getting a refund, check to see if the seller is a member of the Society of Ticket Agents and Retailers (STAR). If they are, you can use STAR's complaints procedure. STAR members should receive a refund at face value if the event is cancelled and the organiser has agreed to refunds.

You'll probably only get the face value of the ticket back - the amount printed on it. Some sellers might refund postage if, for example, the event is cancelled before the tickets are sent. If you had to pay any booking or card fees, you might not get those back.

If the official seller isn't a member of STAR, check how you can solve an ongoing consumer problem with a business seller. You may also be able to get your money back another way, such as through your credit card company.

If you bought your ticket from a ticketreselling website, refunds will depend on the site's terms and conditions.

If you bought from a private seller and the event is cancelled or rescheduled then it is unlikely you will be able to recover your money. We still recommend you contact the seller.

Be aware of scams. Unfortunately, we've found that in these situations, scammers can prey on those who are affected.

If your event is cancelled and people or companies get in touch to offer their services to try to recover money on your behalf, be alert and make sure that you're looking out for the signs of a potential scam.



From the packed village hall car park, you might have thought Taylor Swift was in town. In fact, it was the penultimate Little Hadham Antiques Fair! A courteous young man in trendy specs tipped off my folks that he was vacating his space. I was intrigued. Clearly this was the place to be.

As we headed inside, I realised I might have misjudged what constitutes a local hotspot. This was clearly a more seasoned crowd, but I was happy to be the eager apprentice. At the entrance, a smiling woman collected our pound coins and immediately set the right tone for the day.

Inside I met Dawn, the organiser, who has kept the fair running four times a year for the past four years. Once a more active trader herself, she remains passionate about antique fairs, whether for the social opportunity, the nostalgia of an object that sparks a memory, or simply the good sense of "recycling".

The hall itself was a treasure trove of curiosities. My first find was a metal squirrel nutcracker. Lift its tail and the jaw snaps shut on the nut. A clever little contraption that made me smile.

Further along, I chatted with a seller from North London, her

accent betraying her French origins. Her collection focuses on antique perfume bottles, including a trio of small bottles by "Lanvin parfums" from the 1930s still nestled in their original display box. She works a day job during the week but happily travels on weekends to share her discoveries, sourced from abroad.

Beside her, a seller displayed pottery in bold colours, obviously from different makers but all chosen by the same discerning eye. "How do you choose what to buy?" I asked. "I just buy what I like and hope other people will too," he said. "Seems to be working!"

At another table stood two creatures made by Winstanley, the Surrey pottery famous for lifelike, slightly mischievous animal sculptures. A greyhound and an Arctic hare were poised and alert, their glass eyes bright with questions. Nearby sat a less aristocratic soul: a floppy eared, straw stuffed dog with a worn coat, big blue bow, and a label that simply read "Lovely dog".

The café provided welcome refuge for a quick sit down. £1 coffees and slabs of walnut coffee cake the size of bricks.

Around me, quiet purchases were made. A vase here, a




painting there. I nearly left with a moulded horse's head. A fellow admirer confided, "You could probably talk them down to £20." I hesitated. "But then I'd have to carry it home under one arm." He grinned knowingly. "You'd look like the mafia." We both laughed.

All told, it's a fun outing for pocket change. The traders seem less concerned with sales than with sharing their enthusiasm for the strange, the beautiful, and the rare. They know that one person's clutter is another's treasure, and that both can be true at once.

The fair returns on the **9th November**. Go with a curious mind and an empty stomach.
